## Toll Free Telephone Service Now Remote

The North Carolina Utilities Commission issued the following response after a study had been made regarding proposed toll free telephone service in Madison County. The following letter written to Hal Edmonds, one of the many persons requesting toll free service, was sent to The News-Record from the Ditilities Commission:

October 3, 1969

Mr. Hal Edmonds Route No. 2 Marchall, North Carolina Dear Mr. Edmonds:

On July 3, 1969, this Commission received a petition bearing many signatures expressing an interest in county wide toll free telephone service for Madison County. On July 7, this petitioned was acknowledged to you as your name appeared on the envelope enclosing the petition. In the acknowledgement, you were advised that a toll calling study had been requested from the telephone company and upon receipt of it you could expect to hear further from us.

The cailing study mentioned above has been received and has been analyzed by the Commission Staff. Following are pertinent facts taken from the report:



Hikes Necessary To Cover Costs During Coming Year

Asheville's three general hospitals increased room rates an av-erage of \$2 to \$8 per day on Ocober 1.

Hospital officials termed this new hikes "inflationary," claiming they were necessary to cover the anticipated cost of hospital operation during the coming year.

Memorial Mission Hospital, which last increased room rates Ang. 10, 1968, has put night in the French a \$6 increase, with some exceptions.
