William P. Powell, mayor of Mars Hill since 1965, is the choice of Republicans from the fourcounty 31st Senatorial District to serve out the term of former Sen. Bruce B. Briggs in the State Senate.

Robert B. Long, Jr., Buncombe County Republican Party chairman, said that Powell was unanimously recommended for the post by the 31st Senatorial District Committee at a meeting in Mars Hill.

Under the procedure followed in such matters, Powell's name will go to the Madison County Republican Executive Committee, which will be asked to recommend to Gov. Bob Scott that Powell be appointed.

Long said that state law requires that Scott immediately appoint whoever the Madison County GOP committee recommends. Briggs, who served in the 1967 and 1969 General Ass signed


