Officials Well Pleased With Opening At Local Shed

Vine-ripe tomatoes started pour- and reporting news stories. ing into the Mato shed last Monday afternoon as the local plant started operating for this season.

A long line of trucks bearing tomatoes lined the top of the hill leading to the large shed and machinery started moving, men and women started grading, separating, boxing and loading at 4 p. m. Officials stated that 636 boxes, 20 lb., and 38 boxes (40 lb. No. 3) were graded and boxed on opening day, with 84 producers bringing in tomatoes.

"We are well pleased with both quality and quantity on Monday,' an official stated.

The shed was not opened on Tuesday but did open Wednesday afternoon when 98 producers attended

The Marginou County Board of come oners adopted a \$2,070; 557 budget for the fiscal year trance at their regular meeting this is 1970. This represents a timoren e of \$108,269 over the bad got of 1969-1970 which was 81

Even with the increase the Commissioners were able to drop the Tax Rate per \$100 valuation from the present \$2.05 to \$1.80; how ever with the added rost of the recently passed School Bond it. will take an additional 20c this next year to meet the needed interest payments on the issuing of Bond Anticipation Notes. Even with this the Tax Rate including the School Debt Service will be down to \$2.00 per \$100 valuation or 5c less than this year.

The Commissioners pointed out that this decrease was made possible by an increase in property valuation from last years' value of \$19,993,491 to the present value of \$21,363,324, also the anticipated income from the 1c option Sales Tax is estimated to be about \$100,000 which is a tremendous help to offset the rising cost of County Government.

It was also pointed out that the Special Tax for the Marshall School District has been eliminated since there is sufficient funds on hand to pay these bonds as they fall due. The Special Tax for the Hot Springs School District was decreased to 5c per \$100 valuation from 15c since this fund has accumulated a small surplus in the last few years toward repayment of their Bonds. 

Plans Underway For Wheat Referendum Here Next Week

Robinson Explains Results Of Voting; To Be By Mail

Wheat growers in Madisor County will be voting July 27-31 by mail in a national referendum on wheat marketing quotas for the 1971 crop unless action by Congress before that date postpones jor Cecil Brown, founder of the requiring it.

"Most wheat growers will remember that Congress postponed Haywood County line August 2 the scheduled referendum in 1965, from 10:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. and then passed the Agricultural Act of 1965 which suspended marketing quotas," Emory Robinson, Chairman of the Madison County Agricultural Stabilization and Con- soloists and church groups. All servation (ASC) Committee said.

"However, the Agricultural Act of 1965 expires at the end of 1970, which means that legislation that was in effect prior to 1965 will aply next year. While the 1965 law was in effect, there were no wheat referendums. Now that the law that was on the books before 1966 applies, we are planning to hold a referendum the last week of July," the Chairman explained.
