The victory was the second straight for the Warriors in their first year under new coach Howard Wilson.

The Wildcats checked Erwin in the first period but yielded two touchdowns in the second quarter and the third in the third.

Don Holder smashed for two touchdowns and Mike Sorrells ran for the third.

Holder stormed 12 yards for a score in the second period to break a scoreless deadlock and Tim Fore kicked the extra point. Later in the second period Mike Sorrells ran for 10 yards and the second TD. The extra point try failed.

Erwin made it 14-0 in the third period on Holder's five-yard run.

Mars Hill finally solved the tough Erwin defense for a touchdown when Ken Castelloe scored in the final period.

## Fisher, Dawkins Receive Honors By Lions' Coach

Head football coach Harold Taylor of Mars Hill College announced that Johnny Dawkins of Gaffney, S. C., and John Fisher of Marshall have been named the offensive and defensive players of the week, respectively.

The Lions rode home victorious Saturday afternoon after defeating Glenville State, 15-13. Dawkins caught four passes for 103 yards, including a six-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Marvin Parrott. With Dawkins as a deep threat, he was double-teamed, and this helped open up the Lions' running game.

Linebacker Fisher intercepted two key passes to give the Lions possession late in the game. He also was instrumental in helping stop Glenville's running game. Fisher is a sophomore transfer from the University of South Carolina.

Mars Hill's first home game is Saturday against Catawba at 2 p.m.

## Burton Enjoys Travels Through South America

During the recent summer vacations Fr. Jeff Burton, S.J., a member of the Jesuit Residence in Hot Springs, traveled to several countries of Latin America. His trip began on June 22 when he boarded a Chilean ore-carrying ship which took him to Panama and the Canal Zone. The ship called the "Elqui" left the Norfolk harbor with a destination set for Valparaiso, Chile.

After a two day stay in Panama, Father Jeff Burton flew from Panama City to Santiago, Chile where he stayed for eight days visiting friends he had known in the Chilean capital from 1961 through 1966. He then took the night train to southern Chile where he visited and taught in Colegio San Marco from 1961-1964 in the City of Osorno. Throughout his trip he spoke with Latin Americans about their problems and the future possibilities in the developing countries. His greatest experience was to see the progress made in the areas of education and the rise of a stronger middle class. On a personal level he met many of the students he had taught who are now studying in the universities. He had the opportunity to learn first hand of the political situation in Chile, a country that just elected a Marxist Socialist candidate as its president.

After some three weeks in Chile, he flew to Peru, Columbia, and then into Panama to revisit friends he had seen on the way down. From Panama he went to Mexico City and revisited Cuernavaca, Mexico where he studied his Spanish in 1961 at the Center of Intercultural Formation. On August 7 he returned to Baltimore, Md. where he visited his family before returning to Madison County on August 10. He is presently working at Spring Creek High School teaching social studies and Spanish. On weekends he works at the

Catholic Church in Hot Springs where Fr. Andrew Graves is the pastor. In the coming weeks he hopes to share his experiences with the residents by showing the slides he took on the trip and speaking of the possibilities in the different nations south of the border.

## Mars Hill Lions Down Glenville State, 15-13

GLENVILLE, W. Va. The Mars Hill College Lions stayed from behind here in the fourth period of play to defeat the Pioneers of Glenville State, 15-13 here Saturday. The win gave the Lions a sweet revenge for an opening loss suffered at the hands of these same Pioneers last year.

Ted Williams, a sophomore from Knoxville, Tenn., kicked a 20-yard field goal with 3:08 remaining in the game to provide the winning margin.

The Lions had been put within striking distance on a one-yard scoring play early in the fourth period by All-America candidate Marvin Parrott. Parrott had a good day in directing the Lions for 179 yards passing with 10 completions.

The Lions found themselves trailing early in the game as Ray Swisher, the Glenville kicking specialist, threaded the uprights from 25 yards out with 12:18.

## East Yancey Barely Defeats Tornadoes

The visiting East Yancey Panthers, touted as one of Western North Carolina's strongest football teams, had the daylights scared out of them by the vastly improving Marshall Tornadoes last Friday night on the Island. The Panthers eked out an 8-0 victory but the Tornadoes won the admiration of the fans with their aggressive defense mixed with a potent offense.

As far as the Tornadoes were concerned the loss could go down as a moral victory for the local gridders. The outstanding Tornado player, both on offense and defense, was Harlan Rice, halfback. His thrilling runs, power dives and devastating tackling brought praise from both Coach Reeves and the fans. He was ably assisted by Jimmy Ponder who galloped for several fine gains.

The fine play of the

Tornado line, however, limited the visitors to one touchdown.

The night's only score started with a 61-yard run to the Tornadoes five yard line by Panther halfback Randy Banks at the start of the third quarter. Winters then took the ball over. Winters passed to Boyd Howell for the two-point conversion.

Marshall threatened twice during the night both due to Panther fumbles. Marshall recovered a fumble on the Panthers 47 and brought it down to the three yard line before the drive an interception killed the drive in the third. In the fourth Harlan Rice picked up another Panther fumble and ran it to the visitors' 10-yard line, but the Tornadoes lost the ball on downs.

The win was East Yancey's third while the loss put Marshall at 1-3.

David Whitten passed to Allen Wallin for 30 yards and the first touchdown in the first quarter. The Blue Devils scored twice in the second quarter. Arthur Roberts, fullback, drove into the end zone from the five yard line following a 30-yard drive. Late in the quarter, Whitten passed to Johnny Cook for a 45-yard pass-run play. Arthur Roberts picked up the two-point conversion on an end run. The final TD came in the fourth quarter when Whitten passed to Cook for 36 yards.

Coach Larry Phillips was well pleased with the offense but especially praised the defense for allowing the Bakersville team but one penetration into their territory in the entire game. ## Postal Box Rental Fees To Increase

Postmaster Frank Ramsey has been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount of plans for a 20 percent increase in postal box rental fees.

The proposal, with an effective date set for November 1, calls for increases ranging from 5 cents to \$2.40 for quarterly rental periods. All postal boxes are included with the exception of rural lockboxes at non-personnel post offices.

The proposed increases are expected to yield additional revenue of about \$8 million.

In accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, notice of the proposal has been entered in the Federal Register giving the general public 30 days to respond to the plan. After the 30-day period, the proposal will be re-evaluated by the Postal Service.

Pending final decision, advance payment of box rentals will be limited to the quarter ending December 31.

The last time basic rental fees for postal boxes were increased was in 1958.
