A COOL DESSERT



Meringue is the crowning touch for a refrigerator torte. The torte is made by spreading a mixture of dairy sour cream whipped sweet cream, and strawberries between lemon flavored sugar cookies. For chocolate fanciers, substitute 1's ounces (3 tablespoons) grated sweet chocolate for the strawberries. The cookies are refrigerated 4 hours while the cookies swell and become cake like in texture. After the roll is spread with meringue baked to a golden brown. Then served, cut in diagonal slices.

MERINGUE STRAWBERRY

TORTE 1/4 cup dairy sour cream

2 tablespoons confectioners augar % teaspoon vanilla extract 4 cup heavy cream, very stiffly beaten

4 cup small pieces strawberries 16 Lemon Jumble Rings

2 large egg whites, at room temperature 2 tablespoons granulated augar

teaspoon fresh lemon juice 2 tablespoons slivered blanched almonds Blend together first three in-gredients. Gently fold in cream

nd strawberries. Spread cookies generously with cream mix ture, placing one spread cookie upon another; make three stacks of approximately five. Stand stacks on edge on cookie sheet to make one long roll. Refrigerate 4 hours.

Close to serving time, preheat oven to 475 F. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form: gradually best in sugar, add lemon juice and continue besting until distinct peaks form. Spread meringue over all sur faces of roll. Sprinkle almonds on top. Bake 3 to 4 minutes or until delicately browned. Serve immediately. Makes 8 (apimmediately Makes 8 (approximately 1-inch) servings.

Tip: Leftover roll may be aluminum foil wrapped and

frozen. Thaw at room temperature 1 % to 2 hours.
