A COOL DESSERT



Meringue is the crowning touch for a refrigerator torte. The torte is made by spreading a mixture of dairy sour cream, whipped sweet cream, and strawberries, between lemon flavored sugar cookies. For chocolate fanciers, substitute 1 1/2 ounces (3 tablespoons) grated sweet chocolate for the strawberries. The cookies are then stacked in a roll and refrigerated 4 hours while the cookies swell and become cake-like in texture. After the roll is spread with meringue, it's sprinkled with almonds and baked to a golden brown. Then served, cut in diagonal slices.

MERINGUE STRAWBERRY TORTE

- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup heavy cream, very stiffly beaten
- 1/2 cup small pieces strawberries
- 16 Lemon Jumble Rings
- 2 large egg whites, at room temperature
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons slivered blanched almonds

Blend together first three ingredients. Gently fold in cream and strawberries. Spread cookies generously with cream mixture, placing one spread cookie upon another; make three stacks of approximately five. Stand stacks on edge on cookie sheet to make one long roll. Refrigerate 4 hours.

Close to serving time, preheat oven to 475 F. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form; gradually beat in sugar, add lemon juice and continue beating until moist distinct peaks form. Spread meringue over all surfaces of roll. Sprinkle almonds on top. Bake 3 to 4 minutes or until delicately browned. Serve immediately. Makes 8 (approximately 1-inch) servings. Tip: Leftover roll may be aluminum foil wrapped and frozen. Thaw at room temperature 1 1/2 to 2 hours.
