
He also said that the event would be held regardless of the weather. The State Patrolmen have



Madison County's Proposed Consolidated High School

Construction is scheduled to start immediately on Madison County's new comprehensive high school, shown in the architect's color rendition, to be built on the Marshall By-Pass, U. S. Highways 25-70 between Marhall and Walnut at a cost of approximately \$2 million. The consolidated school will re-place the five existing high schools at Mar-shall, Mars Hill, Hot Springs, Laurel and Spring Creek. The school, to be completed in 12 months, was made possible by overwhelm-

ing passage of a \$950,000 school bond issue by the people of Madison County in 1970. J. Bertram King of Asheville, project architect, has worked closely with Robert Edwards, su-perintendent of Madison County Schools, the perintendent of Madison County Schools, the Madison County Board of Education, and the Division of School Planning in Raleigh to plan a facility that will accommodate broad academic and vocational curriculums. With an overall area of 126,000 square feet, 32,000 square feet is devoted to occupational educa-

tion. Other programs will include the humanities, sciences, music, art, and there will be complete facilities for audio-visual instruc-tion, drama and lectures. The library is of an tion, drama and lectures. The intrary is of an open design, readily accessible from all areas of the building. Physical education is an im-portant part of the program and the gymna-sium will have a seating capacity of 3,000.
