## Tips on Buying a New Home

• First, determine your needs—size of your family, future family needs, type of housing, special amenities. • Determine what you can afford: downpayment, mortgage and interest, taxes, insurance and operating and maintenance costs. • The traditional rule-of-thumb is that price should not exceed two and a half times your annual income. Another rule-of-thumb is that monthly housing costs should not exceed one full week's take-home pay. But your own personal guidelines may vary from the rule. If you have large savings or substantial equity in your present home, you may want to spend more for your new home. • Your way of life, values and family size may call for you to spend more "home-oriented" than others and are willing to travel and entertainment, to spend more for their homes. • In picking a neighborhood consider such things as time and distance to place of work, to schools, shopping, churches, availability of public transportation and recreational area, fire and police protection. Is the neighborhood well kept? • Shop around for the best possible financing on the mortgage—at savings and loans, mutual savings banks, commercial banks, mortgage companies. • Find out about the builder. Ask him how he stands behind his work. Ask previous customers about his business reputation and his performance for them. • When the appointment is made to officially "close" the purchase, ask your builder in advance for a complete list of closing day needs. These are cash costs which must be paid when you actually complete the purchase, and they are in addition to the price of the home. • No house is perfect. A house is a complex product, has thousands of parts. All houses are subject to natural changes in soil conditions and shrinkage of wood. Before you take possession understand fully your maintenance responsibilities and the builder's obligations. Discuss this with the builder. Find out what is covered by the builder's warranty and those of the manufacturers of appliances such as furnaces, air conditioners, hot water heaters, etc. Your builder can make available to you a highly useful maintenance booklet which describes what goes into your new home and how to take care of it. When you first consider buying a new home, you might check with the local home builder association affiliated with NAHB about obtaining a copy of NAHB's Home Buyers Guide.

## Traveler can create good will for U. S.

Getting abroad can be more rewarding for the American who takes time to learn something about the people, places and way of life in the countries on his itinerary. In addition, he can help make points for the United States in the international popularity contest. For, whether the traveler likes it or not, he is in effect an unofficial representative of his country and countrymen. Knowing something about the cultures, traditions and conditions in the host country could help create good will both for the United States and all Americans.

One of the main things the traveler should remember is that he is a guest in the foreign country and must respect its laws, regulations, customs, etc. Another is to be careful about what he says of the government, living conditions, and the local citizens. A surprising number of people around the world speak or understand English—in many countries it is now the second language. Careless talk could brand you as an "Ugly American." There was, for instance, the loudmouth in the Tokyo hotel lobby who made a salacious remark about an attractive Japanese girl passing by. Both she and her male companion understood English—it was obvious by their reddened faces. I was embarrassed, too, for the Japanese couple and for all other American tourists. Actually, it isn't all that difficult to acquire some basic information on the people and places along the way. They usually differ from country to country so I try to read at least one book for background before heading overseas. I also carry along an English-foreign language pocket dictionary, an up-to-date guide book and other informative materials. Some of the latter can be obtained free from national tourist and promotion boards, air and shipping lines, and travel agents in advance of departure.

Guidelines Some Europeans still kiss a lady's hand in greeting—not nearly enough, however, according to my wife. But generally Europeans shake hands—a quick pump-like motion—with men and women every time they meet. They also will be

impressed if you hand them your calling card.

In Eastern Europe, and parts of the Middle East, don't be surprised to see men welcome each other with a bear hug and kisses on the cheek. And there is nothing unusual in some of the Mediterranean countries for two men to walk hand in hand.

In India and many countries of Asia the customary greeting is holding the hands as in prayer and a slight inclination of the head. Japanese usually greet one another by bowing—the deeper the bow the more important the person. But the western-style handshake is becoming increasingly popular. Unless the other person offers his hand first, the visitor should bow his head slightly on meeting. Calling cards also impress the Japanese—and other Asians.

If your sightseeing tours include places of worship, observe common courtesies and religious traditions. Women are expected to cover their heads and arms when visiting Roman Catholic churches. Men must be suitably dressed, too.

You will have to take off your shoes before entering Moslem mosques and generally cover your head when visiting Jewish synagogues.

Your shoes will have to be left outside also in Japan and other parts of the Orient at homes, inns, restaurants, tea houses and other places where the old custom is maintained. In Moslem countries, use your right hand only for eating, drinking, touching and other normal activities. Do not smoke, eat, drink or take photographs in any religious place unless permission is granted. And be doubly careful where you aim your camera in the East European countries—they are very security conscious and you could end up in jail. Never take pictures of people without prior approval. Generally people will be glad to pose—sometimes for a slight fee—but there are some in Africa and Asia who object on religious grounds. Aiming a camera at them could mean trouble. Do NOT ever call porters, waiters or any one else in Asia or Africa "boy"—it is regarded as a derogatory term associated with the days of colonialism. And for goodness sake, remember your manners.
