Annual Horse Show On Island Saturday

The annual Marshall Charity Horse Show, sponsored by the Marshall Lions Club, will be held this Saturday on the Island. Officials state that there will be two shows the afternoon show to start at 1 p.m. and the evening show at 7 p.m.

In case of rain, the show will be held Sunday, June 8, it was announced.

Honorable C. D. Jackson, of Roanoke, Va., will be the Judge. He is a member of the Racking Horse Breeders Association of America.

Mr. Lloyd Thompson, of Asheville, will again be Master of Ceremonies and Mr. Roger Wood, of Marshall, will be the Ringmaster.

The Show Committee is composed of Maurice McAlister, Jerry Plimmans, John Corbett, Roger Wood and David Caldwell.

Mrs. Jerry Plimmans will serve as Show Secretary.

Officials announced that a Veterinarian will be on call as in past years, there will

be hamburgers, hot dogs, candy, soft drinks and other "goodies" available on the grounds.

Officials have also announced that there will be a total of 38 classes with 19 showing in the afternoon program and 19 in Saturday night's session, including six championships.

Proceeds will be used to further the Lions projects for the visually handicapped and blind, plus other community projects.

three horses entered will be shown. The show will consist of the 38 classes listed on the program. No classes will be added.

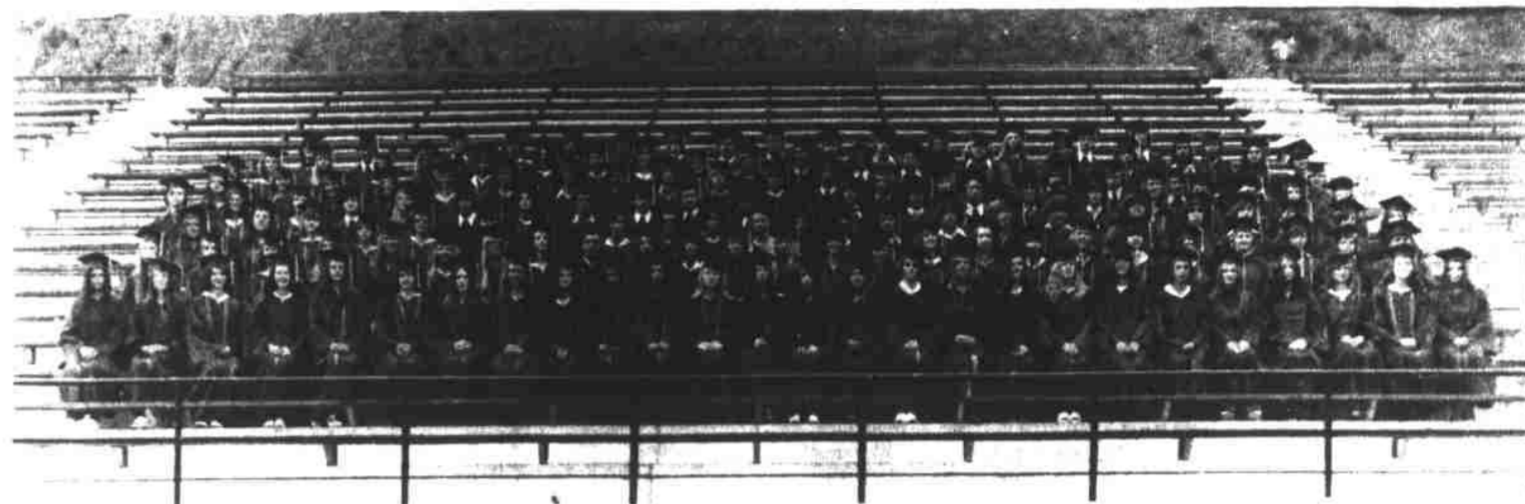
Racking horses are to be exhibited and judged by the rules of the Racking Horse

Each person will be charged admission at the gate. Exhibitors, owners, etc., will be given a ticket that will be refunded at the Secretary's Desk upon registration of the horse or horses in the show not to exceed two tickets per horse.

King Murder Case Mistrial; Capps Found Guilty

The May term of superior court for the trial of criminal cases adjourned last Thursday with two jury trials heard and several minor cases disposed of. Judge Harry C. Martin, of Asheville, presided with District Attorney Clyde M. Roberts representing the State.

In the case of State vs.

Mason King, of Route 3, Marshall, who was charged with the murder of his brother, Beechard King, also of Route 3, Marshall, a mistrial was declared by Judge Martin after the jury remained deadlocked for eight hours.

The other jury trial involved Ernest Capps, of the Foster Creek section of Madison

County who was charged with assault with deadly weapon inflicting serious injury or Ted Honeycutt.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty and Capps was sentenced from 3 to 5 years in Central Prison in Raleigh.

The two jury trials consumed most of the four-day session which began on Monday of last week.
