## Trout Production Course Dec. 4-8

Already many persons from North Carolina, 15 other states, Canada, and even two foreign countries have enrolled in the Trout Production course at Haywood Technical Institute to be held Dec. 4-8. These people realize the tremendously increasing importance of aquaculture in our national and world agricultural economy. With the prospects of a trout processing plant to be established in Western North Carolina, trout production interest has increased in the mountain area.

Topics will be included in the course will be: aeration, recirculation and filtration, ammonia removal, water chemistry, waste removal, development of a successful feeding program, pond and raceway design, cage culture,

fisheries marketing, and overall management of a trout farm. Instructors will be experts from the U.S. Trout Farmers Association, Southern Appalachian Trout Growers Association, Rodale Resources, Ziegler Brothers, N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, and N.C. Department of Agriculture.

### Loose Leaf Burley

**LOOSE LEAF BURLEY**

The first sale of untied burley in bales was held last Friday at warehouses over the

burley area. In Asheville, 54,886 pounds sold for an average price of \$128.80 per hundred weight. This compared to \$129.55 for tobacco sold in the conventional manner or three-fourth cents per pound more than bales.

Belt-wide, the regularly handed tobacco brought 61 cents per hundred pounds more than bales. This is very encouraging news for those farmers who are planning to sell their crop in bales.

The next sale date for baled tobacco will be Dec. 7.

#### TUT ENLARGED

NEW YORK (AP) — What is described as the world's largest photographic transparency will be on display in New York's Grand Central Terminal from Aug. 28 to Oct. 9.

The 18-by-60-foot Kodak Colorama — enlarged 200 times from a 5-by-7-inch transparency — will show part of a back panel of a gold throne found in King Tutankhamun's tomb in Egypt's Valley of the Kings.

It shows the king seated in one of the halls of his palace while his wife Ankesenamun ministers to him from a small jar of scent or ointment.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art will unveil the exhibition, "The Treasures of Tutankhamun," in December. The show has been touring the United States for nearly a year.

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
