The efforts of Appalachian women to understand their "Appalachianess" took a new turn last week when the Council on Appalachian Women held its spring meeting in Cincinnati.

Women from the thirteen Appalachian states were invited "to get acquainted with our urban sisters outside Appalachia," explained Nina Poage, vice president of the Council on Appalachian Women. Or, as Jeanne Hoffman of Mars Hill, the Council's Executive Director put it, "If you spend all your time contemplating your navel, you'll never learn anything about yourself. We went to see what is happening to Appalachian migrants, to find out what Appalachian people — rural and urban, living inside and outside the region — can learn from each other."

"We came away with a new consciousness of a kinship network, and values so strong that they have lasted in urban areas even through one or two generations," Mrs. Hoffman said.
