

# Greater Ivy Represents County In Beautification Judging Friday

The occasion will be the area judging of the community club division of WNC Beautiful, the beautification competition of the annual Western North Carolina Community Development Program.

The Friday schedule gets under way at 9 a.m. with a tour of Union Mills community in Rutherford County, Bridgeport-Enon in Burke County, Ashford in McDowell County, Linville Falls in Avery County, Newdale in Yancey County, and Greater

Each community is allotted 45 minutes for judging.

Area judging involving county winners of the non-community club division of WNC Beautiful, for organizations and groups other than community clubs, will be held in early September. Eleven county winners, representing Buncombe, Burke, Haywood,

Henderson, Jackson, McDowell, Macon, Madison, Polk-Rutherford and Transylvania counties, are competing in this division. Judging in this division will be done from standard report books completed by the competitors, rather than by on-site inspection.

Announcement of winners of both divisions and presenta-

tion of cash awards totaling \$2,000 will be made at a luncheon meeting of the WNC Community Development Program Committee scheduled for noon, Sept. 18, at the S & W Cafeteria in the Asheville Mall.
