tes recommended for initial survey-ing, according to Frank Gatton, assistant state archivist, no one has yet taken up the project

"It really isn't that difficult a task," Gatton said, "and can be done by any group or individual."

Though the Department of Archives recommends the formation of a local committee to oversee the project, one is not necessary, as evidenced by the efforts of the Greater Ivy Community Center.

"It does need an ongoing effort," Gatton said, "one that is best kept going by a local forum that knows the

Dillingham added that if the county can get one member from each of its eight or nine community development organizations, they could easily form the basis of an ongoing commit-

Cemetery Survey can be obtained at the Madison County Public Library or the News-Record office in Marshall; and at the Rural Life Museum or the Appalachian Room in Mars Hill. Gatton says it is not necessary for those filling out the survey to know any of the topographical coordinates, such information can be gathered at a later time.

"What is most important is that we have the cemeteries registered with the state archives so we can protect them," Gatton said.

Dillingham suggests that all completed surveys be returned to any of the four locations, so copies can be made for the public library's records. Librarian Lucille Roberts has put together a notebook identifying some of the Madison County cemeteries.

"I believe it was George Bernard Shaw who once said 'How we treat the dead is a clear indication of how we treat the living," Dillingham added. "Out of this effort we put forth here is going to come a great benefit for many generations to come who have there roots here in Madison County.'






