Property Taxes Cut To 75 Cents

The Madison County Board of Commissioners gave final apat 10 a.m. Everyone is invited to attend and bring a picnic proval to the county's 1986-87 budget on Monday during a special called meeting in Marshall. The \$7.9 million budget brings with it a 15-cent reduction in the county's ad valorem tax rate.

Commissioners Ervin Adams and James Ledford voted to approve the budget package during Monday's meeting. Board Pauline Zimmerman will be the speaker. Everyone is invited member Virginia Anderson of Hot Springs was unable to attend the hearing.

The new budget, which took effect on Tuesday, is a \$400,000 increase over the 1985-86 general fund budget. Despite the increase in spending, cutbacks in state and federal funding forced the commissioners to trim the local budget.

Hardest hit by the budget cuts were the Madison County Department of Social Services and the county Health Dept. Additional cutbacks forced the dismissal of two sheriff's deputies. A total of 13 county employees, including 10 from DSS, lost their jobs in the cutback.
