Mars Hill College gave NCAA Division 1 opponent South Carolina a run for their money Monday night as the Gamecocks stuggled to a 77-69 over the Lions.

The game wrapped up an unsuccessful week for the Lions, who lost all four games they played. The game, the first ever with South Carolina, also brought the Lions' season to a close.

In Monday's game at Columbia, S.C., the NAIA-member Lions were able to keep it close most of the game, but could not overcome the larger Gamecocks.

Micheal Foster and Terry Dozier combined for 41 points for South
