To Be Open Twenty Working Days

An arrangement has been reached between Senator F. M. Simmons, chairman of the Democratic State Executive Committee, and Senator J. C. Pritchard, chairman of the Republican State Executive Committee, respecting a construction of the meaning of the election law in the matter of the time the registration books shall be kept open. The Attorney General has decided that the statute means that the registration books shall be kept open 20 twenty working days prior to the day on which they are required to be closed. Under this construction Thursday, Oct. 24, will be the day to open the books and Saturday, Oct. 26, the day to close them.

An Address on Peachland.

[The following is clipped from the Wadesboro Messenger and Intelligence, and is an address delivered before the Peachland Improvement Association at a recent meeting.]

My theme is Peachland, beloved Peachland! Around this name cluster sweet, sacred and lively memories; yet we dare not boast of what she has been or of what she is, for that might savor of timidity. Moreover, this is no time for boasting, but straight ahead and to the front is our watchword. Towns, like individuals, have a character. Behold Peachland! look at her! and judge for yourselves. In deeds, for more than in words, she is writing her history upon the rock of time, where all men may behold it, and where the hand of eternal ages can never efface it. Towns, like cities, States and nations, live for centuries. They rise slowly; like the sun, they ascend to their high noon. Then they descend, leaving behind them a long train of light and glory, if their course has been beneficent, and for the good of mankind Peachland has not yet reached the height of her prospect. She has not yet attained the pinnacle of her greatness; nor can she until she is more densely populated with a people of push, purse and push; until her name is on every tongue, from the blue mountains of the west to the waves that beat against the eastern shore; until our little ocean drink deeper for the fountains of knowledge and with their hands uplifted in holy pride, can say, "Peachland is indeed my mother" until the monotonous clang of the mill gong cease to the hum of the steady ton-dry, and until the drays laden with the produce of the land are drawn by the music of the harp, the buzz of the card, the hum of the spindle and the click of the loom. You have merited the highest commendation for what has already been accomplished, but let me bid you to keep your eye upon the watchword, "Onward and upward," and allow me to express the confidence of the work you have done and are still doing. May it stand as a proud monument to your effort, and that to the near future you may be able to look back with pride upon what you have done in this one of the most laudable of enterprises.

In conclusion ladies and gentlemen, I cannot better express my sentiments than by taking the immortal poem from the pen of Milton and appropriating it in the following manner:
O Peachland, dear Peachland! heaven's blessings attend thee;
