**THE CHILD LABOR BILL.**

On August 8, the Senate by a vote of 53 to 12 passed the Keating child labor bill. Both Senator Simmons and Senator Overman voted against its passage. Speeches had been made against it by Senator Overman and Senator Hardwick, of Georgia.

The bill, in so far as it relates to hours of service, says: "That no produce manufacturer, or dealer shall ship or deliver for shipment in interstate or foreign commerce any article or commodity the product of any minor quarry, situated in the United States in which within 30 days prior to the time of the removal of such product thereafter children under the age of 16 years have been employed or permitted to work, or any article or commodity the product of any mill cannery, workshop factory, or manufacturing establishment, situated in the United States within thirty days prior to the removal of such product therefrom when children under the age of 14 years have been employed or permitted to work, or children between the ages of 14 years and 16 years have been employed or permitted to work more than eight hours in any day, or more than six days in any week, or after the hour of 7 o'clock post meridian or before the hour of 6 o'clock ante-meridian; providing, that a prosecution and conviction of a defendant for the shipment or delivery for shipment of any article or commodity under the condition herein provided shall be a bar to any further prosecution against the same defendant for shipment for deliveries for shipment of any such article or commodity before the beginning said prosecution.

"That the Attorney-General, the Secretary of Commerce, and the Secretary of Labor shall constitute a board to make and publish from time to time uniform rules and regulations for carrying out the provisions of this act.

"That for the purpose of securing proper enforcement of this act the Secretary of Labor or any purpose duly authorized by him, shall have authority to enter and inspect at any time mines, quarries, mills, canneries, workshops, factories, manufacturing establishments and other places where goods are produced or held for interstate commerce and the Secretary of Labor shall have the authority to employ such assistance for the purposes of this act as may from time to time be authorized by law."

A report issued by Commissioner W. H. Osborn shows that only five States in the Union contributed more revenue to the Federal Government for the fiscal year ending June 30th than did North Carolina, New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Kentucky and Indiana being the States leading North Carolina. The aggregate amount collected from this State was \$19,543,586.25.

Three members of the North Carolina coast artillery reserves in annual encampment at Fort Caswell, near Wilmington, lost their lives Sunday while bathing in the surf. The dead are first Sergeant William Ardroy and Lance Corporal Leonard Swalm, of the Charlotte Company; Fred White, of the Salisbury Company.

**STATE AND GENERAL NEWS**  
The dam at Lake Toxaway, in the western part of the State, broke last Sunday, caused by a spring at its base. The dam was one-eighth of a mile long and 50 feet high and was erected at a cost of \$38,000.
