### A MATTER OF NERVE

By SAUVOYARD, in News and Observer

The Germans were correct when they said all during the winter of 1914-1915 that the war would be decided in favor of the belligerents who discovered the better "nerve". That is what decides all wars. It was held by the Teutons more than a year that the nerve of France was demoralized, and that was the reason for the greatest and the longest battle of all history—the drive on Verdun. It was confidently expected at Berlin that nothing could withstand German arms or equal German nerve. Verdun proved the fallacy of that idea. Today the army of France is stronger than at any other period of the war, and the nerve of France is steeper, though France has endured greater hardships than any one of the belligerents. Indeed, France is the great surprise of the war.

How much longer will the German nerve be able to stand the strain? As for the physical part of the struggle, there is small evidence of German weakening; but the nerve part of it is also moral, and there is those who think Germany's morale is decidedly impaired.

The evidence of this is seen in the manifest longing for peace by the German people. Of course all peoples of the entire world long for peace; but it is true that peace is more necessary to Germany than it is to England, or France, or Italy, or the United States. The great nations of Germany's enemies have communication and commerce with all the rest of the world, except in so far as they are impeded by the German U-boat campaign, which has not met German expectations, and when America shall complete and send across the ocean the fleet of anti-U-boat craft now building the danger from that quarter will be greatly diminished.

The U-boats are a mighty draft on German reserves. Only picked men are fit to man them, and it is the most dangerous service ever accorded by those who want to sea. It draws on the navy for its young, its strong, its brave, and its chosen, so, the said, sometimes amounts to the ordeal of a tortoise in the last of substitutes that a tortoise the German naval chiefs as much as lack of men fit to man them.
