DR. MYERS DEAD

Dr. R. W. Myers, formerly a citizen of Dunn, died last Tuesday morning in a hospital in Winston-Salem, after an operation for a throat trouble. It was not thought the operation would prove fatal and the announcement of his death came as a complete surprise to his friends in Dunn and throughout the State.

Dr. Myers was a young man, just passed thirty years of age, and is well known here where he practiced dentistry. While a citizen of Dunn he was married to Miss Pauline Wade, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Martin L. Wade, who, with one child, survive him.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin Wade, parents of Mrs. Myers, attended the burial, which took place Thursday in Winston-Salem.

HARVEY NAYLOR DEAD

Harvey Naylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Naylor, of Sampson county, died at Camp Sevier, Greenville, S. C., last Saturday and his body arrived in Dunn Monday morning, accompanied by Alena H. A. Lee, a comrade. Pneumonia was the immediate cause of his death.

The funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the home of his parents, in Sampson county, eight miles from Dunn, and the burial took place immediately afterward, under the auspices of the Masonic Lodge and the Woodmen of the World, he being a member of both these lodges. Deceased was a young man of good character and was drafted into the army the latter part of the summer. He was well known in Dunn, where he was a frequent visitor before leaving for the training camp. His death is unusually sad, as he was the first of the soldier boys of this section, to die. Deep sympathy is extended to the immediate family and numerous other relatives.

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PROPER MANNER OF ADDRESSING MAIL

Those Who Write to Soldier Boys Should Observe Following Instructions

Postmaster Eugene T. Lee has been asked by the Camp Sevier military officials to call the attention of the patrons of the Dunn office to the following details concerning the proper manner of addressing mail to the soldiers stationed there and at other camps and cantonments.

1. All mail should be very definitely addressed; that is, not only the names of the larger organizations but the smallest unit to which a man belongs should be put in the address.

Thus:

JOHN DOE,
Co. M, 119th Inf.,
Sevier Branch
Greenville, S. C.

2. The full name of the addressee should be given as there are to be found a large number of the men with the same name and initials in the camps.

3. The return address of the sender should always be put in the upper left hand corner of all letters and parcels.

4. All parcels should be securely wrapped and packed in substantial boxes and the address written in ink. Perishable matter ought never to be packed in paste board boxes as it is liable to decay and consequently ruining the package and making it and other mail difficult to handle. Pencil marks are easily rubbed off and easily become blurred when wet by decayed perishable matter.

WAR ACTIVITIES IN WASHINGTON

Washington, D. C., Nov. 27.—The population of the City of Washington has increased at least 50,000 since the war began. It is natural that the capital city, the center of governmental activities, should show this marked increase.

At the request of the United States Civil Service Commission, the Washington Chamber of Commerce has undertaken the work of directing to suitable positions a large number of desirable men, with or without board, are listed, and with very moderate rates. Application for accommodations can be made by new appointees through correspondents before leaving home or by calling at the office of the Washington Chamber of Commerce, No. 611 Twelfth St. N. W., upon their arrival in Washington.

Stenographers and typewriters make up a large part of the additions to the force at Washington. Thousands have been appointed and thousands more are needed. Ship draftsman for the Navy Department, mechanical drafters for the service generally, and statisticians and clerks known as clerks qualified in business administration, clerks qualified in statistics or accounting, index and catalogue clerks, balance of stores clerks, and schedulers for the Ordnance Department of the Army are also in great demand. Representatives of the United States Civil Service Commission at the post offices in all cities are furnishing detailed information concerning positions at Washington in which workers are needed.
