LEGUME PLANTS.

Peasants, red clover, crimson clover, bur clover white clover, alfalfa and cow peas are among the important legume plants. Legume bacteria will thrive upon the roots of these plants if the soil is not overcharged with destructive forms of bacteria.

Destructive forms of bacteria inhabit soils that contain forms of acid obtained from the sour forms of humus.

Carbonates and alkali applied to soils eradicate destructive forms of bacteria. This is why calcium carbonate (lime) is applied to soils to destroy harmful forms of bacteria.

Most soils that are free from harmful forms of bacteria will grow legume plants. Each legume plant carries its own kind of bacteria. These bacteria are bred in laboratories and soils.

An inoculated soil means a soil that contains legume bacteria that will form a nodule on the root of a legume plant. These legume plants are said to increase the fertility of soils.

The process of increasing the fertility of the soil is carried on by the bacteria that forms the nodule on the root of the legume plant.

Nature has made a provision for legume plants that other plants do not enjoy. The roots of the oak, pine, corn, cotton and many others are not loaded with rich stocks of nodules that contain available nitrogen.

There are \$11,000,000 worth of nitrogen in the air over each acre of land. This nitrogen is not available. It is in an inert form.

The legume bacteria that form nodules on the roots of legume plants inhale this inert nitrogen of the air. The process of inhaling and storing this nitrogen in the nodule makes it available. This is the work of the little bacteria that forms the nodule on the root of the legume plant.

These nodules are about 8 per cent nitrogen and a good crop of cow peas and clover will carry in one season about \$160, worth of available nitrogen to each acre. This is the cheapest way to secure nitrogen and increase the fertility of your soils.
