READY TO HELP

The law of 1917 authorized the State Highway Commission to give the country people of the state expert advice in developing small sanitary water powers for community and domestic use, for water supply and sewerage disposal systems, and light and power in homes and barns. The bill also covers country telephone systems. Upon request an expert will be sent to advise any farm community in these fundamental concerns of

country home conveniences. The University has placed its facilities and facilities at the service of the State Highway Commission to carry out the purposes of this act. To this end a new division of the University Extension Bureau has been formed under the name of Country Home Comforts and Conveniences. It consists of the departments of Rural Social Science, Electricity, Hydraulics and Sanitary Engineering. Letters calling for assistance can be addressed to Hon.
