**REVALUATION AS A MORAL ISSUE**  
Fundamentally, the question of revaluation of North Carolina property on a uniform and equal basis of 100 per cent. is a moral issue. The North Carolina state conference of Social service recognized this at its session in Raleigh a year ago when it adopted the following declaration:  
"We congratulate the general assembly upon its evident purpose to reform our present form of taxation. Nobody like our conference, concerned with the moral welfare of our people can fail to note the moral menace to our citizenship involved in the present system of taxation with its shameful inequalities and the attendant evasions and falsehoods, corrupting the civic life of our people to a dangerous degree."  
At a meeting in Goldsboro last week this conference, composed of some of the most earnest and public-spirited men and women from all sections of the state, again went on record concerning this matter as follows:  
"This conference rejoices in the determined efforts now being made to destroy the evil of inequalities of taxation, and to eliminate the dodging of taxes, the competition among counties and individuals to reduce tax valuations, and the unfairness which our present system is responsible for, and we believe that no minor and incidental mistake of operation should blind our people to the fundamental importance and lasting benefits of the great general principle involved."  
In this declaration the conference reflects the opinion of the great majority of fair-minded and well informed people in the state. When an honest man wears to list his property at its full value, he wants other people compelled to do the same thing.—Raleigh News and Observer.

**HOW TO EASILY ROLL UP BARBED WIRE**  
I use many temporary barbed wire fences and have had much experience with many different methods of rolling up barbed wire, and I now give my best method.  
For each roll you wish to make procure a board one foot wide and three feet long and saw a few small notches in each end. Cut your wires down one at a time, bottom wire first, then go to the end of wire and staple it in notch. Catch hold of board at the center, one hand on each side, and begin to roll. Stay behind and let wire lie on the ground, rolling from you all the time. Pull on wire at intervals to keep it tight by sliding roll of wire backward. As the roll is revolved, let the wires come first to right and then to left, crossing the wires to prevent any from falling off. One man can easily do this, whether the land is hilly or bushy. Try my method and be convinced that it is the best.—A. in The Progressive Farmer.
