The Road to Health. Even while the war was claiming thousands of lives on the European battlefields, hundreds of thousands of lives were lost here at home because of preventable diseases. The war is over. We have won the fight for Democracy, but we have yet to win the fight against this more insidious, more pernicious, and in the aggregate more direct foe of mankind—disease.

Do you keep your home clean and well aired? Is your drinking water safe? If it comes from a spring or well, are you sure that no drainage from a privy, cesspool, or stable can pollute the water? Is the milk which your children drink either pasteurized or scalded? Do they each receive three glasses of milk daily?

Do you know that flies and mosquitoes carry disease, and do you keep them out of your house by proper screening? Do you know that all colds are "catching" and may lead to dangerous disease in others, especially children? Do you know that sickness is often spread by dirty hands? Do you always wash your hands before eating or handling food?

When any of your family is ill with scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria, whooping cough, typhoid fever, tuberculosis, or other preventable diseases, is your health officer always notified so that he can help to keep the disease from spreading to others? Is your home connected with a sewer? If not, have you a sanitary fly-proof privy? Finally, are you and your family physically fit? How do you know? Have they been physically examined as the soldiers were? Do you know that yearly medical examinations are useful to detect early signs of illness and so prolong life? If you can answer "yes" to all these questions, are you certain that your neighbor can, too? Don't let his carelessness endanger your health. In this great emergency the government looks to all of its people to give it their whole-hearted support.—U. S. Public Health Service.

Mrs. Minnie Tart, wife of Mr. Loftin A. Tart, prominent lumber man of Dunn, died at her home on South Magnolia Avenue last Saturday afternoon at 2:45 o'clock, after a lingering illness of several months duration. The funeral service was conducted from the home Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock by her pastor, Rev. J. J. Langston, who was assisted by Rev. J. M. Daniel, pastor of the Methodist church. Interment was made in Greenwood cemetery immediately afterwards.

Minnie Lee Tart was born March 25, 1832, at Newton Grove, Sampson county, making her stay on earth thirty-eight years, six months and twenty-one days. She was united in marriage to Mr. Loftin A. Tart on October 18th, 1905, and to this union was born four children; two boys, Clarence L. and L. A. Jr., and two girls, Alice May and Agnes Gray.

Twelve years ago she gave her heart to God and united with the Christian church. Since that time she has been a faithful, conscientious, and unobtrusive worker in her church. She remained loyal until the end and was of strong faith and a prayerful, Christian woman. She was a patient sufferer through many months of pain and confinement, showing that her faith was well founded, and she did not fear the approach of death. Surviving her is her husband, four children, her mother, three brothers, N. B. Lee of Dunn; Rev. E. Frank Lee of Greensboro; and A. W. Lee of Newton Grove. Two sisters, Mrs. Y. J. Tests made by the United States Department of Agriculture with 130 Australian wheats recently introduced into this country have brought out three varieties adapted for growing on the Pacific coast, where they have produced larger yields than some of the native commercial varieties. They are known as Federation, Hard Federation, and White Federation. The Australian varieties in general are susceptible to most cereal diseases, but many of these are not destructive in the Pacific coast region.
