

REV. J. L. STEWART CLAIMED BY DEATH

Aged Baptist Minister Passes Away; Funeral Today In Clinton

Rev. onathan L. Stewner died at his home, three miles southeast of Raleigh, at 11 o'clock Sunday night. Born near Aberdeen abunce coun-ty, Mississippi, June oin 1835, he both rear Abertages and reconstruction of the University of North Casolina from which he was graduated in the class of 1857.
