REV. J. L. STEWART CLAIMED BY DEATH

Aged Baptist Minister Passes
Away; Funeral Today
In Clinton

Rev. Jonathan L. Stewart died at his home, three miles southeast of Raleigh, at 11 o'clock Sunday night. Born near Aberdeen, Sturges county, Mississippi, June 23, 1835, he came as a young man to the University of North Carolina from which he was graduated in the class of 1857. This class numbered a number of men destined to figure prominently in the affairs of the State as well as to be granted unusual length of life. Among them were Governor Bingham, Hon. B. F. Grady, Judge A. C. Avery, and Col. Thomas Kenan. So far as is known, Col. Bingham is now the only surviving member of this class.

After his graduation, Mr. Stewart read law at the University under Dr. Samuel Phillips and began the practice of his profession there upon getting his license.

About this time he was united in marriage with Miss Emily Mildred Cave, daughter of Dr. Hudson Cave, of Chapel Hill, N. C. After his marriage he moved to Clinton, where he entered actively into the practice of his profession, combining with it one time the principalship of the Clinton Female College. Before this he had entered the ministry of the Missionary Baptist church and in this field he distinguished himself on less than in the law in which he was a shining light throughout the early years of his life. He served in his day many churches in Sturges county and was for about thirty consecutive years moderator of the Eastern Baptist Association composed of parts of Sampson, Duplin and Wayne counties. He was for many years a trustee of the State University, and at one time represented his district in the State Senate.

As a lawyer he was regarded as one of the ablest in the State, in his day. He combined with great legal ability unusual gifts as an advocate and was a power before a jury. His scholarly attainments were recognized at the time of the establishment of the Agricultural and Mechanical College at Raleigh when he came within one vote of being elected the first vice-president of that institution, a position which he did not seek.

The following families survive him: Mrs. H. W. Battle, Charlotteville, Va.; Mrs. James T. Murphy, Washington, D. C.; Mrs. L. A. Dethune, Clinton, N. C.; and Miss Mary C. Stewart, Clinton, N. C. Two sons, William B. Stewart and John B. Stewart of Clinton, have been some years dead.

By a second marriage Mr. Stewart was united with Mrs. Elizabeth Bennett, of Sampson county, who survives him, together with one daughter, Miss Dettie Stewart.

About a year ago Mr. Stewart moved to Wake county where he has since lived on a farm near Lenoir's store. Almost blind, nocturally and physically feeble, and growing weaker from day to day, he fell on sleep at the close of an exceptionally long busy and useful life.

The body was taken to Clinton yesterday and the funeral will be held there this morning at 10 o'clock, conducted by Dr. Walker M. Johnson of Raleigh.—Tuesday's News and Observer.
