**RICH TOP DRESSING REVIVES FADED LAUNDS**  
Launds get a tired look late in summer and can be stimulated and made fresh, according to experts of the

United States department of agriculture, by a light top dressing, composed of 2 parts good loamy soil one of well-rotted manure, finely comminuted, or good compost in which soil predominates, with 1-2 pounds of sulphate of ammonia or nitrate of soda, for every 1,000 square feet.

The mixture should be applied evenly and will result in quick stimulation and new green growth. A mixture with a good proportion of soil is strongly urged, especially when the chemicals are used as they will burn the grass when used too liberally on the lawn. If the grass is watered after the fertilizer is applied it should be thoroughly and liberally done.

**State College Weekly News Letter**

A series of five lectures on "Eugenics" by Dr. William Louis Poter, president of Wake Forest College, commenced the week at the Summer School. The lecturer, who is one of the foremost biologists in the country handled this difficult scientific subject very skillfully, and his clearcut exposition of the making of a new organism, the influence of heredity, environment and training on the life of the individual, and his strong plea in the closing address for a broader more comprehensive view of the sex relationships made a profound impression upon the teachers.

To meet the growing demand on the part of students for business knowledge and training, the board of trustees of the college, at their last meeting, established a Department of Agricultural Economics and Business Administration.

The new department, headed by Dr. Carl C. Taylor, will offer four distinct curricula; one in general business administration, one in shop management and manufactures, one in farm business and marketing, and one in rural life. These courses lead to the bachelor of science degree.

The courses in the new department are planned with appreciation of the fact that a majority of the men who attend an institution teaching agriculture and engineering want thorough training in the technologies of these professions. In some of the curricula it is possible for the student to take, in addition to his business courses, practically a three year course in one of the technical departments of the college. It is also possible for a student to complete the course and receive a degree in business administration by pursuing full time work in this department for one year after receiving his degree in any other department.

Entrance requirements and full details of the organization and course of study at a new degree level, just off the press, which may be obtained by addressing E. B. Owen, Registrar, State College Station, Raleigh, N. C.

North Carolina roads are going to have sign posts on them as soon as the district engineers get their maintenance plans into operation, and care of the roads will include maintenance of sign posts at every crossing that will give the wayfarer accurate and understandable information as to whether he is headed, how far it is, and if there are any detours to be made, the condition of the detour.

Orders to this effect have been issued to the district engineers by state highway engineer, Charles M. Upham. The nine district men have been asked to submit to the chief their notions of what the signposts ought to look like, and from among the nine, one design will be selected and made standard for the whole state. Anywhere the traveler sees one of the signs, he will know that it is accurate and official.

With the constantly developing stream of automobile travel in North Carolina, the sign posts will be of invaluable help to the people of the state. No concerted effort has ever been made to properly mark roads, although some work in this direction has been made by counties. Largely it has been left to the whim of the local advertiser and as often as not sign posts get the traveler hopelessly lost.
