

CUMBERLAND LANDS DECREASE IN VALUE

Fayetteville, March 22.—Commissioner's sales and sales under mortgage give some idea of land values now, as compared with values a few years ago. This morning 47 acres of the old Duncan Shaw homestead on the Rutherford road, 2 1/2 miles west of Fayetteville, sold at auction at the 11 o'clock hour for \$5,500. On the premises is a good two-story dwelling, the old Shaw residence.

The land is located on the Aberdeen and Rockfish Railroad, which renders it very valuable as an account of good transportation facilities.

This land was put up at auction three years ago and bid in at \$147.50 an acre. Today it brought only \$117.50 an acre. The purchaser was H. W. Campbell, of Rutherford. It has been well advertised both in regular legal ad and in display ads.

The land was sold by C. G. Rose, J. A. Oates and H. E. Williams, acting as commissioners. It is the opinion of men who know values that the property went at a low figure, as it is claimed that a splendid farm can be made of the place.

KNOW NORTH CAROLINA: WHAT CAROLINA NEEDS

North Carolina cannot live on its past. What are we willing to give toward its future? Within the boundaries of this commonwealth are all the requisites for the building of a great state—soil, climate, natural resources, means of communication, and an aspiring people.

North Carolina needs faith in herself. To believe that the golden ages lies in the past rather than in the future is a denial of faith. When the

backward look dominates a people it is already in the first stages of decay.

North Carolina needs a revisor of its organic law. The present constitution must be made to square with the facts of modern times. A constitution which does not grow with a progressive people is destined in time to become a barrier to further progress.

North Carolina needs a country life commission. Artists whose population is eighty per cent rural can never go far beyond the average standard of living of its farming people. The co-operative movement is an indication that the farmer purposes to have a more distinctive voice in his economic affairs. But, man does not live by bread alone—even though the bread made from wheat scientifically grown and co-operatively marketed. The good things of life—education, recreation, health, culture—may all come to the residents of cities in their compact groups without additional stimulus from the state. A country life commission would interest itself in promoting a more equal

distribution of these good things to the food-producers.

North Carolina needs an earnest, concentrated campaign to wipe out the blot of illiteracy. The level of a state's progress must always be gauged by the extent of the people's ability to share in the thoughts, hopes, aspirations, discoveries, and movements of humanity. So long as

North Carolina has a white illiteracy rate higher than that of 46 other states in the Union, her level of progress will be lower than it ought to be.
