The annual nesting period of the house hawk has arrived with the usual round of complaints and outbreaks against His Majesty by the bird ladies. Now to those who are troubled let me give a sure and preventive. A ten cent bottle of T. Asafotida, chip it up, drop it in a bottle or jar, fill the vessel with water, moisten the chicks feed with it and refill the vessel with water once each day. This is sure to keep the birds, rats, mice, weasels and bigger from bothering your chickens and also keeps the chicks in healthy condition. Nothing but acrimony will kill one of them. When you wish to eat one isolate it for a few days and feed pure grain. The Asafotida need not be renewed over than once a month for a flock of 100 chicks.

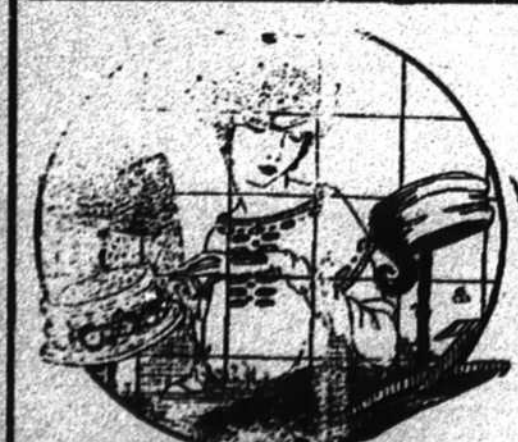
