

DAUGHTERS TO MEET AT GREENSBORO NEXT

Adoption of Resolutions and Special Reports Feature The Closing Day
 Wilmington, Oct. 14.—Greensboro was selected at the closing session of the silver anniversary convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy yesterday as the place of the 1922 meeting. The convention adjourned at noon today and delegates are tonight departing for their homes in all sections of the State.

At the morning session a resolution authorizing the contribution of \$500 to the Matthew Fontaine Maury Memorial in Richmond, Virginia, was adopted and a proposal introduced to make the Robert E. Lee Memorial chapel at Washington and Lee University fireproof.

Dr. Henry Louis Smith, president of Washington and Lee, appeared before the convention and gave a detailed report of the proposed renovations at the Lee chapel. Mrs. Jackie Daniels Thrash Morrison made a report on the Jefferson Davis Memorial at Mayview, Kentucky. District reports consumed the remainder of the session.

TWO MORE CASES OF "GLAND" LARCENY ARE FOUND IN WINDY CITY

Chicago, Oct. 15.—Reports of two more newly discovered cases of "gland" larceny, following the report that Joseph Wozniak had been overcome and robbed of a gland, were on the hands of the police tonight.

Henry Johnston, an electrical employee, on hearing of the operation performed on Wozniak, voluntarily came forward and said he had been the victim of a similar attack but had kept it secret at the time for fear of the notoriety. He added that he was told at the hospital where he was treated of a third victim.

At the time Dr. Hugh M. McKeechie, of the Chicago Medical Society, after a conference with members of the organization, announced every effort would be made by the society to find what seemed to be a new form of banditry. Captain Coughlin, of the police department, said anyone arrested in connection with such an operation would be charged with mayhem, punishable by a sentence of from one to fourteen years in the penitentiary.
