Hood, Jr., formerly of Norfolk., is proprietor of the laundry. Mr. Hood is an experience ed laundryman, having had several years' experience in the laundry busi-

The equipment is for washing and machinery installed will do the washing for twelve different families at the same time, and yet the clothing of no two families is mixed in the least. The plant is capable of taking care of the washing for 500 fareilies each week, according to Mr. Hood.

The plan under which the laundry will be operated provides for the clothing to be called for and delivered the same day, free laundry bags being furnished by the laundry. The charge for washing is \$1 per family. dry clothes. All over 20 pounds will be charged for at the rate of 5 cents |

All washed clothes are dried with an automatic drying machine, with ne danger of breaking buttons or injury to clothing. When the finishing touches have been applied this laundry will be one of the very best equipped damp-wash laundries in the State.
