The Dunn Family Laundry was opened for business yesterday. This new enterprise is located in a new brick building adjoining the plant of the Dunn Ice & Fuel Co., North Vance street.

The equipment is for washing and is up-to-date in every detail. The machinery installed will do the washing for twelve different families at the same time, and yet the clothing of no two families is mixed in the least.

The plan under which the laundry will be operated provides for the clothing to be called for and delivered the same day, free laundry bags being furnished by the laundry.

All washed clothes are dried with an automatic drying machine, with no danger of breaking buttons or injury to clothing.

It was through the efforts of the Dunn Chamber of Commerce that the laundry was established in Dunn and it will fill a long-felt necessity here.
