Carthage May Be Forced to Drop Increased Water Reservoir Scheme

SOUTHERN PINES IS READY

The opening guns of the first barrage laid down by the National Re-employment Service were fired at a meeting in Southern Pines Thursday, high spots of which were:

1. Recognition that there exists a national emergency of greater proportions than at anytime since the world war, and that every effort should be exhausted in aiding the President in his courageous effort to bring the drifting millions of this country to a safe and sane anchorage in the port of peace, prosperity and tranquility.

2. Recognition that such is impossible except by placing our great number of unemployed in gainful occupation so that they can provide food, clothing and other necessities of life for themselves and their dependents, thereby enabling them to retain their self-respect and to foster and perpetuate whatever amount of civilization they have absorbed.

3. It was the consensus of opinion of those present that the county should borrow \$100,000.00 from the government at a low rate of interest, with the government granting 30 percent, which means that the county would only have to re-pay approximately \$70,000.00, over a long period of years. This money to be used for immediate work on whatever projects that will be of the greatest benefit to the county as a whole.

Southern Pines is preparing to launch public works to the extent of \$10,000.00 with an expected increase as the work progresses, so stated D. G. Stuts, mayor.

Edgar A. Brown, of Hemp, proposed a sanitary district for Hemp, whereby they can qualify for a loan from the government to install a water system at Hemp, cost not estimated.

Mayor J. Vance Rowe, of Aberdeen suggested that Aberdeen was greatly in need of a general renovation of their water system, which now has a considerable amount of wooden pipe installed that is decaying and must be replaced with iron pipe.

ed they had had under consideration the building of an additional reservoir at the pumping station of around a million gallon capacity, and the extension of water and sewer mains at an estimated cost of \$40,000.00, but they had learned it would not constitute an absolute self liquidating project and if put into effect would necessitate an increase in city taxes.

This, in the writer's opinion, is an unpleasant subject to the ears of the taxpayers. However, we find ourselves unable to pay taxes already levied and will be unable to pay in the future unless we can bring some actual money into the community; therefore we feel that if more jobs can be made, the merchants, property owners and everybody will in some degree be benefited to such an extent they can take care of any additional levy that would be necessary. We, therefore, urge the property owners of Carthage to rally to the support of our city commissioners and encourage them in doing their part along with the county and other towns and communities in the county.

A committee composed of twenty-five of the leading citizens of the county, including the mayors of the towns within the county, members of the national re-employment committee, heads of the civic organizations and others were appointed to call upon the county commissioners and city commissioners to outline various projects that will be of most benefit to all and urge that steps be taken immediately to provide as many jobs as possible.

Our people here and in the nation have never failed to do their duty in an emergency, as evidenced by their patriotic cooperation during the world war. We are now in a greater emergency and I know our citizens will respond 100 percent in the aid of their less fortunate brethren.

Two Shallow Wells Sisters, 17 and 19, Claim They Were Kidnaped

Sanford, Sept. 1.—In Lee county Recorder's court this week, Herman Chandler and Doug Sloan, two young men of Broadway, were given a hearing by Judge T. J. McPherson on a charge of kidnaping Edna Sloan, 19, and her sister, Margie Sloan, 17, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sloan who live near Shallow Well church. Eugene Richardson of Raleigh is also charged with taking part in the kidnaping, but has not yet been located.

The Sloan sisters testified that on Sunday, Aug. 20, as they were walking to church, Chandler and Richardson, who were in an automobile, accosted them and invited them to go for a ride. They said they were taken to Raleigh and detained for a week in an old house. When asked why they did not leave, the girls said that they were afraid to do so, as their lives were threatened.

Judge McPherson placed Chandler under a bond of \$1,000 for trial at the next term of Superior court and discharged Sloan on the charge of kidnaping, but placed him under a bond of \$500, as a material witness in the case.

However Sheriff Salmon of Hargett county was waiting for Chandler with a warrant charging him with holding up and robbing the proprietor of the Pineview filling station, \$200 and Chandler was turned over to him. At Lillington Chandler, Jessie Fry, Dude or Doug Sloan, and the two Sloan girls were bound over to Superior court in connection with the Pineview filling station robbery.
