A Nourishing Dainty



THE dessert course may be made at once an epicurean delight and a source of real nutriment, by serving that delicious dainty known as "apple whip"—or "apple snow." It is very simple to make, if one has at hand a can of applesauce. For even apples are now put up in this convenient and well-cooked form. The work of peeling, coring, cutting, cooking and straining is thus eliminated. To the stiffly beaten whites of three eggs add gradually a medium size can of applesauce. Sweeten to taste with powdered sugar and continue beating until the mixture is light and fluffy. Serve in individual sherbet-glasses, with a bit of whipped cream and a maraschino cherry topping each. This combination of eggs, cream and fruit has real food value, and at the same time makes a light and palatable finish for a substantial meal.

One does not always have a supply of whipping cream on hand; so it is well for the housewife to know that she can use evaporated milk and whip it just as satisfactorily as the fresh cream. This is because the cream is all left in the best brands of evaporated milk. It is necessary only to chill it thoroughly before whipping; also the bowl in which it is to be whipped. It should be whipped just before serving, as it will not stand up so long as fresh cream. If desired, sweeten and flavor with a little vanilla. It will be found to be a delicious and economical substitute for whipped cream.

Apple whip is a dainty, not-too-heavy dessert which rounds off to perfection the mid-day or evening meal. It appeals to children as a "sweet," and is especially nourishing for them.

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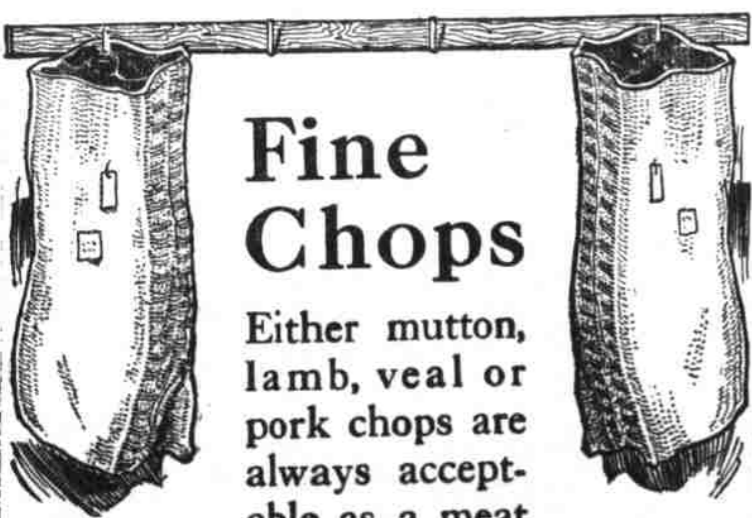
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
