Lloyd Noel Whitener, eldest living child of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Whitener, passed from this life on May 10, 1926. He was born June 10, 1909. He is survived by a mother, father, sister and brother and it was with deep and genuine regret that the relatives and many friends received news of the death, which occurred at Hazelwood on Monday morning after several days of illness at Hazelwood, where the family have resided for a number of years, and while a semi-invalid. To quote the Rev. Mr. Tew, "To know Lloyd was to love him." He was a member of the Waynesville Baptist Sunday school and only a short time before he died expressed himself as being prepared for a future life. His life was spent among books and flowers, of which he loved dearly. He was a lad of genial disposition, thoughtful and kind, and possessed a fine mind filled only with high and noble thoughts, and it was a saddened throng which gathered at the Baptist church on Tuesday for the funeral to pay a lasting tribute to this sweet child who has passed from among us. Services were conducted by the Rev. C. T. Tew, assisted by Rev. B. F. Yandell and Rev. T. F. Marr. The services were concluded at Green Hill cemetery where the grave was entirely covered with flowers, the beautiful floral tribute going to show the esteem in which the town in general held for the family, we can think only that the Father who knows and understands all things has taken home to Him a choice flower in the young life cut down in its young manhood at the age of seventeen. Six little girls attired in white acted as flower girls and carried armfuls of purple irises to the church and cemetery, while Walter Maloney, Kelly Breeding, Taft Matney, Claude Davis, Graham Ferguson and James Kuykendall acted as pallbearers.

is before the Supreme Court and Superintendent of Public Instruction Allen says the case is very important for education. William C. Pressley is to be inaugurated the president of Peace Institute here on Tuesday night, June 1, preceding the exercises of the graduating class of that institution of 1926. Greetings to the new president will be extended by the heads of other educational institutions in Raleigh, by Dr. Harrison of State College, by Dr. David H. Seallon, of

Durham on behalf of Davidson and Queen's Colleges, and others. The induction will be by Dr. W. Mac White, Raleigh; the charges by Rev. H. B. Searight of Washington, N.C.; inaugural committee being Drs. White Scallon and Mrs. C. C. McAllister, of Fayetteville, an alumna of Peace.

Destructive forest fires in the mountains of Western Carolina the past week have given state authorities deep concern. Calls for assistance have come to Governor McLean with the suggestion that military companies be sent to the rescue. The Governor has no authority to order guardsmen to fight fire and reminded authorities of the stricken area of the right to order out all able bodied men between the ages of 18 and 45 to do service in emergencies of this character. They may also commandeer horses and property needed in their work.

State Insurance Commissioner, Stacey Wade, leaves for Washington today where he will deliver an address before the United States Chamber of Commerce at its fourteenth annual meeting in session there this week. Commissioner Wade will talk North Carolina, of course.

While "Our Bob" is shelling the woods for votes, Walter Siler, campaign manager for Senator Overman, is busy building an organization that he expects to bring out the vote for Overman on June 5. The senatorial contest promises to hold the center of the stage in the political arena this summer. The Supreme Court justices who are to stand for re-election have no opposition. Nor has A. J. Maxwell for Corporation Commissioner. The only state-wide fight will be for United States Senator.

October 7th, date of the battle of King's Mountain, is not to be North Carolina Day at the Sesqui-centennial celebration in Philadelphia as announced some weeks ago by Governor McLean on being asked by the mayor of the Quaker City to "name the day." It turns out that "Sister Tennessee" was first to the hat. Another day has not yet been designated for North Carolina.

The Bank of Warsaw, which happened to be the depository of the American Legion at the time, recently closed its doors. But the State Commander, Henry L. Stevens, and E. P. Davis, finance officer of the organization, made good another \$4,800 of Legion funds. Another evidence of the wisdom exhibited by the Legion convention in putting Henry Stevens "at the head of the table."

Annual Memorial Day exercises were held here at the Confederate cemetery today, the principal address being delivered by Governor McLean and special music by State College Band and a chorus from Hugh Morson High school. Graves of veterans were decorated with flags and flowers by the Manly Battery Children's Chapter of the Confederacy and magnificent dinner was served surviving comrades at the Soldier's Home by the Johnson Pettigrew Chapter United Daughters of the Confederacy under whose auspices the exercises of the day were held.

W. Bruce Mabey, extension entomologist at State College and J. T. Lazer, County Agent of the same institution, have resigned their positions to accept work elsewhere, the latter returning to his native state of Montana where he will render similar service. Both of them have fine official records to their credit.

The State Department of Revenue expects soon to transfer its activities to the new building especially prepared for it, corner of Salisbury and Morgan streets. The license bureau will go along with the other divisions of the department, but may not move until later in the summer. In fact, it may be July before Governor Doughton finds himself in the new quarters.

Information touching the progress of North Carolina is desired from far and wide, according to Commissioner Graham of the State Department of Agriculture, who is doing his best to answer all inquiries. Recent magazine articles have helped mightily to attract attention to this state and the praises of the Land of Opportunity are being heralded far and near every day in the week and every week in the year.
