Calls for assistance have come to Governor McLean with the suggestion that military companies be sent to the rescue. The Governor has no authority to order guardsmen to fight fire and reminded authorities of the stricken area of the right to order out all able bodied men between the ages of 18 and 45 to do service in emergencies of this character. They may also commander horses and property needed in their work.
