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PARKING ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen that the Parking Ordinance for the Town of Waynesville be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

Section 14A. That it shall be unlawful for any person to Park a Car on any of the Streets mentioned in Section 1, between the hours 4 A. M. and 7 A. M. This Ordinance Passed the first Reading July 1st, 1926.

The cut worms played havoc in the early part of the season, the cabbage worm and bean beetle has made their appearance in some sections, but so far have not damaged the crop very extensively. The potato crop promises to be very good with the present outlook, with a reasonably good fruit crop thrown in, the farmers of the community can live at home and not go to town or some western state for their flour and other supplies.

Dr. P. A. Roberts of Haywood Institute filled the pulpit at the Baptist church Sunday in the absence of the pastor and preached a very interesting and instructive sermon on seeking.

"AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$10,000.00 BONDS OF THE TOWN OF WAYNESVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA, FOR STREET PURPOSES."

Be It Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Waynesville, as Follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, bonds of the Town of Waynesville, North Carolina, are hereby authorized to the amount of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$10,000, for the purposes hereinafter described.

Section 2. The proceeds of said bonds shall be applied solely to the constructing or reconstructing with bricks, blocks, sheet asphalt, bitulith or bituminous concrete laid on a solid foundation, or with concrete, the surface of roads, streets or highways in said Town, whether including or not including contemporaneous reconstructing or reconstructing of sidewalks, curbs, gutters or drains and whether including or not including any necessary grading.

Section 3. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 4. At least one-fourth of the cost exclusive of the cost of paving at street intersections shall be specially assessed against the adjacent property owners.

Section 5. A statement of the debt of the Town of Waynesville has been filed with the Town Clerk pursuant to the requirements of The Municipal Finance Act, 1921, and is open to public inspection.

Section 6. All expenses to be defrayed by means of the bonds hereby authorized are necessary expenses of the Town of Waynesville, within the meaning of Section 7 of Article VII of the Constitution of No. Carolina.

Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective upon its passage, as provided in the Municipal Finance Act of 1921.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 8th day of July, 1926, and was first published on the 7th day of July, 1926.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
