Whatever one may say of Bacon and other famous actors who have taken the role of "Lightnin," Bill Jones, in "Lightnin," every person who saw the Williams Stock Company's presentation of this splendid Golden success Wednesday evening, must hand it to Elmore Lazine. The lovable old good-for-nothing "Lightnin," Bill Jones, who loved everyone and everything in the world, who wouldn't harm anything, who was violently opposed to work and just as fond of his "nip," and who was rated one of the most picturesque liars of the country, gave Mr. Lazine marvelous opportunity and he made excellent use of every one of them. There was not a word nor facial expression—out of place or out of tune with the fine old character part. Every detail—make-up, costume and lingo—was faithfully given and absolutely true to type.

Mr. Lazine did credit to himself and his company by this wonderful show and many people of Augusta should be sorrowing today that they missed the performance.
Al Williams, as the judge, did some work that could barely be improved upon by the most finished actor. James Marsh, as Attorney Thomas, was fine in his deepdyed villain part. Lee Allen was par-excellence itself as John Marvin, young law student and leading man. May Blossom Williams was good as the winsome Millie Buckley and Fred Durand made a cracker-jack hard-boiled persistent sheriff. Marie de Gaiferely, as Mrs. Davis, Al Perrin, as Harper, and Ruth Marsh as Mrs. Harper, all contributed the best of their talents in supporting Mr. Lazine's magnificent characterization.

Mr. Lazine's work stood out, however, from all others, and he may well be rated hereafter as a finished character actor of the highest degree.
Lee Allen, orchestra director and violinist of the company, repeated his rendition of "Listen to the Mockingbird," much to the great delight of the audience. Mr. Allen gives four or five beautiful variations to this most familiar air.

May Blossom Williams sang two very pretty songs between the acts, "I'm Sitting on Top of the World," and "Ten Thousand Years," demonstrating that she can sing as well as act. In the latter number, Lee Allen joined her in duet on the refrain.
Al Perrin and Gertrude Hughes came back with another woe in the form of a song and dance turn, with bit of wise cracking on the side.
