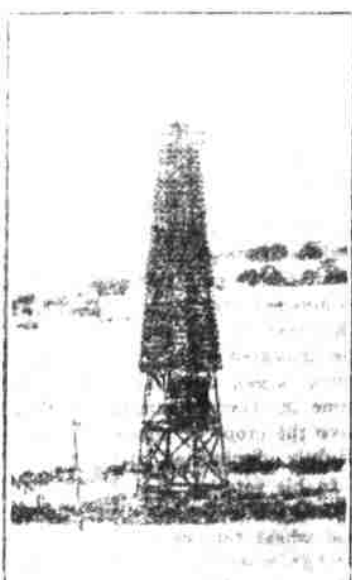


Old lighthouse at Cape Henlopen which has toppled into the sea after 160 years of service; it was built by the British in 1765.

In recent years the government has equipped many of its lighthouses with portable gas. The system of lighting employed in many farmhouses throughout the land. The gas is generated automatically and the light turns on and off night and morning by the operation of a valve. The system was first tried successfully in 1902 in Mobile Harbor ship channel, where eleven lights were installed and are still in operation.

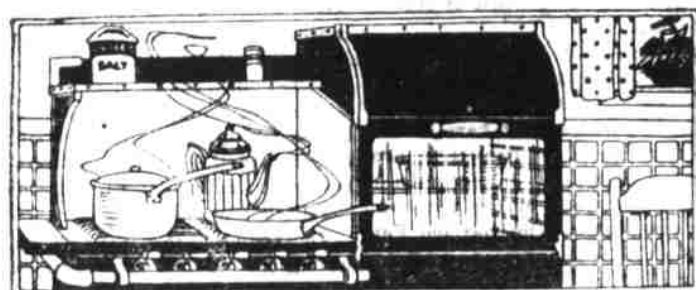
Nearly all important lighthouses are now lighted by carbide gas, either compressed in tanks or generated automatically. By avoiding the expense of keepers, the government is able to operate many more lighthouses than was previously possible. Until this method was adopted practically the whole of the Alaskan Coast had been left unlighted. The same system is also used along the 44 miles of the Panama Canal.

One of the most famous lighthouses of modern times is on Richardson's Rock, 200 feet above the water at the Santa Barbara Islands, off California. It is lighted by the carbide-gas system and flashes every three seconds during the night. Since its installation in 1912, it is estimated to have flashed more than 70,000,000 times without failure.



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A Dollar Dinner for Four

Planning an inexpensive dinner menu every day, for a family of four, taxes the ingenuity of the housewife. The following suggestions for a \$1.00 menu may prove welcome.

- Chicken Broth
- Baked Beans with Onions and Bacon
- Escalloped Tomatoes
- Whole Wheat Bread and Butter
- Quick Cherry Cobbler
- Coffee

EXCELLENT brands of chicken broth may be had for 15 cents a can. Two medium-size cans of baked beans, required for four people, cost at the rate of 3 cans for 25c, at sales, making 2 cost 17c. For escalloped tomatoes, 1 large can at the rate of 2 for 25 cents costs 13 cents. A small loaf of whole wheat bread costs 10 cents. Enough coffee for four people, at an average cost of 40 cents a pound,

is about 4 cents. A can of cherries for the Quick Cherry Cobbler costs about 29 cents. It is made thus: Drain the syrup from a can of six-oz. cherries, and put the fruit into a buttered casserole. Sift 2 cups prepared cake flour and mix with 2 1/2 cups of water. Let well as 1 pour over fruit. Bake 20 to 25 minutes in moderate oven. Serve with sauce made from thickened cherry syrup. The above items of food come to a total of 88 cents. 12 cents may be allowed to cover the cost of the sliced onion to be mixed with the beans, 3 slices of bacon for top of beans in casserole, flour for cobbler, butter and sugar for the meal.

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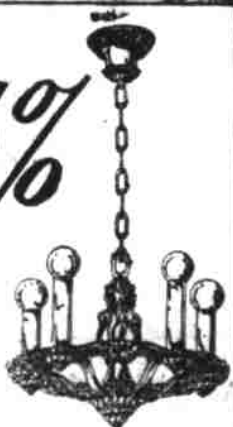
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
