TO CELEBRATE COMPLETION OF HIGHWAY.

Franklin, N. C., Aug. 25.—Another link connecting the mountain counties of Southern Appalachia has forged. Completion of highway No. 285, a ribbon of concrete between Dillsboro and Franklin, connects Asheville and Atlanta, and the mountain counties along the route.

The road extends from Asheville to Dillsboro along No. 10, to Franklin over No. 285, to the Georgia line over 286, to Cornelia over 15, and to Atlanta over 13, the latter being known as the Piedmont Air Line highway.

This route is 32 miles shorter than any other between the metropolis of the mountains and the Gate City of the South.

Completion of this connecting link is a real event in the lives of these two cities and of the Soutland; it is even bigger to the people of the mountain counties of southwest North Carolina and north Georgia and they are going to celebrate it in a fitting style. The date has been set for September 15.

On the morning of that date, the North Carolina delegations, representing the towns from Asheville to Franklin, will meet the delegations from Georgia, North Carolina's guests, at the State line. The Georgians will be escorted to Franklin, where officials of both states will speak briefly on the achievement that is welding together the people of this section, and upon what it will mean.

Speakers will include former Governor Morrison, Frank Page, chairman of the the State Highway Commission, and J. G. Stikeleather, ninth district highway commissioner, all of North Carolina, and highway officials and leaders of Georgia.

Dinner will be served in Franklin, and from here the motorecade will inspect the road to Sylva, where they will be further entertained. At Waynesville, Canton, and other towns along the route there will be brief stops, and at Asheville the chamber of commerce of that city will entertain the members of the motorecade at dinner at Kenilworth Inn.

The North Carolina committee has personally visited the towns from Franklin to Cornelia and extended invitations to officials and citizens to participate; and, through the co-operation of the officials of the Piedmont Air Line highway and the mayor of Gainesville, the other cities south to Atlanta are being invited to help in the celebration of the opening of the Asheville-Franklin-Atlanta highway.

The committee confidently anticipates that every town will be fully represented. The invitation is to

all. The latch-string of Franklin and North Carolina, it has stated, "hangs outside the door."

CENTRALIZED INDUSTRY CONSERVES RESOURCES.

Centralization of the oil industry is having an important effect in stabilizing production and conserving sources of supply, declares the American Research Foundation. In its report, it says: "There are 16,000 producing oil companies in America, but 60 per cent of the oil production comes from the wells of 150 companies. Competition, however, is maintained in a high degree, owing to the fact that no one company produces more than four per cent of the total."
