Large Number Join Motor Club

Greensboro, N. C., Oct. 4.—Commemorating its fourth anniversary the Carolina Motor Club has just experienced the greatest membership production of any single month in its history, it is announced by Coleman W. Roberts, vice-president.

During the month just passed 655 new members were added to the club roster, which has moved up to fourteenth position among the 841 organizations that compose the American Automobile Association. Last September the club ranked fifteenth. The Carolina Motor Club was founded September 22, 1922.

Previous to the record breaking month the largest number of new members secured any one month was 524. This was in June, 1925. The average monthly membership is 451. No "high pressure" methods are permitted in membership solicitation and the growth of the club has been steady and consistent as its services have expanded and the motoring public has secured an idea of the scope of its activities.

In line with the expansion of club activities and services, the personnel has been increased and early in the spring it was necessary to move into larger quarters. Headquarters are now maintained at the large colonial residence at 219 East Market street, Greensboro.

Appalachian Scenic Highway

(Special to The Mountaineer.)

The new concrete highway work just south of Gainesville, Georgia on the Appalachian Scenic Highway has been completed and was yesterday opened for through traffic according to information received from Henry H. Ester, president of the Georgia division at Gainesville. This eleven miles continuous stretch of paved highway eliminates the last troublesome detour between Asheville and Atlanta, 264 miles of hard surface road via Bryson City, Brevard, Lawrenceville, Decatur, Atlanta. Cars are easily averaging 35 miles an hour over this route. The auto-cade being organized by J. H. Enwright to make this trip October 18th, will limit their speed to 30 miles in order to keep the 100 or more cars expected, in their numerical order in line.

The auto-cade will spend the night at Gainesville, Georgia and will be given a banquet in Atlanta. It is open to all people own automobiles and care for the auto-cade to Atlanta. At the time in Atlanta the Appalachian Scenic Highway will hold its second annual meeting, according to Roscoe Marvel, President.

CULLOWHEE MAN KILLED IN CRASH.

Foot Ball Season is Opened

The Waynesville township high school foot ball season was formerly ushered in last Friday afternoon, 1st, when Waynesville High met and defeated the strong and well coached High School team of Brevard.

The Sapphire lads uncorked an aerial attack that threatened the Waynesville goal. Two forward passes, well timed, netted the Brevard team about fifty yards, endangering the Waynesville uprights. While on Waynesville's ten yard line Brevard fumbled, Waynesville recovering the ball and pushing it back into the visitor's territory, thus ending any serious menace to its goal.

The Waynesville High line was practically impregnable, the visitors making only four first downs through the line.

Through the first two periods the teams battled to a scoreless tie. Shortly after the referee's whistle called the third period into action, by a series of line plunges and end runs Waynesville placed the ball on Brevard's four yard line and James carried the ball over for the only scoring of the game. James dropped back, but his attempt for the extra point fell short. The fourth period, like the first and second periods, found both teams unable to score.

The features of the game were the line plunging of the backfield and Captain Don Hyatt and the broken field running of James and Jones and the stonewall likeness of the Waynesville line in the punches. Brevard completed two of the prettiest forward passes seen here in a long time. MASONS AID DISTRESSED IN FLORIDA.

Washington, D.C.—The Masonic Service Association has telegraphed offers of aid to the Grand Master of Masons in Florida. A representative of the association left here recently to confer with officials in the devastated area and determine the amount of assistance needed from Masonic standpoint.

A donation of \$2,500 for relief work was sent by the Grand Lodge of Masons of California. The message accompanying the money said that additional funds would be sent if needed and that funds also would be sent to Mobile, if financial assistance there is needed.

One thousand dollars was sent to the lower East Coast storm centers by Solomon Lodge No. 20, of Jacksonville. The money was sent by a special representative to be delivered in person to the Deputy Grand Master of the South Coast District to be used as he saw fit for relief work.

Safety Topic of Motor Club

Says Motorists Have Too Little Time for Safety Thoughts.

Motorists have too much on their minds and have difficulty in finding room for thoughts of safety because they carry their domestic and business troubles with them in the opinion of W. F. Shipman, Assistant Manager of this district of the Carolina Motor Club.

The Carolina Motor Club official, following the example of the officials of 856 other clubs affiliated with the American Automobile Association, has been studying the behavior of motorists in an effort to discover why there is so much apparent carelessness. The preoccupation of the motorists mind is one of the principal features thus far disclosed by the investigations.

"Motorists carry their business and domestic troubles with them," says Mr. Shipman, "and the result is there is very little time and room in their minds for thoughts of safety. The housewife does too much shopping at the wheel. The business man puts too many deals while he is dodging pedestrians. Altogether, the situation is not conducive of safety."

How this conclusion was reached, says Mr. Shipman, is as interesting as the conclusion itself, according to those who have studied these facts. Members of the safety and accident prevention committee of the club were commissioned to accept offers to ride with local motorists to discover what the drivers were thinking about. Almost invariably the drivers launched into a conversation regarding their interest. The assumption was that there had been no one in the car to talk these matters over with the driver, he would have discussed them over with himself mentally.
