NOTICE OF TOWN OF WAYNESVILLE SEWER ASSESSMENTS

The persons hereinafter named and any and all other persons interested in property fronting on any of the hereinafter mentioned streets, which streets have been included within the special assessment districts in the Town of Waynesville, will take notice that the report of the City Engineer has been deposited in the Office of the Town Clerk of the Town of Waynesville for inspection by parties interested, which Engineer's report sets out the amount assessed against the property owners for two-thirds off the total costs of laying sewers and the material therefor in and upon the following streets, and the said parties will take notice that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen will meet at the Mayor's Office in the Town of Waynesville on the 4th day of November, 1926 at 4 o'clock P. M. for the hearing of allegations and objections in respect to the special assessments and any persons dissatisfied with said report will file objections in writing under oath with the Town Clerk on or before said date.
