LILLIAN GISH FOUND HER IDEAL ROLE IN "BOHEME"

Role Not Acted But Lived—Picture Boasts Notable Cast; John Gilbert as Her Lover Achieves Triumph.

Has Lillian Gish, star of many roles, found the ideal one—her supreme contribution to the art of the screen?

Many people say so, after having seen her Mimi in "La Boheme." Never before did role fit artist, and artist fit role, so ideally as Lillian Gish and the character of the little wistful waif of the Latin Quarter, in the quaint romance at the Wayneswood Theatre, Nov. 18-19th.

"La Boheme" is known and loved by millions; Lillian Gish is famous wherever the motion picture is shown. Her roles have been many and varied; she was a southern rose in "The Birth of a Nation," a quaint Yankee maid in "Way Down East," a little beaten waif of Limehouse in "Broken Blossoms," and a French revolutionary heroine in "Orphans of the Storm." An ethereal nun in "The White Sisters," and an aristocratic mediaeval maid in "Romola"—she has played practically every type of womanhood.

But the new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production portrays her in a role that she seems literally to live and breathe; she does not act Mimi—

she veritably IS Mimi! Her delicate romance; her glorious faith and her wonderful love for her poet, her wistful appeal—she is veritably the embodiment of the soul of woman.

A notable cast was directed by King Vidor in the new picture, Miss Gish's first American-made play in some years. John Gilbert, as the poet Rodolphe, reaches the heights of genius opposite Miss Gish, and Roy D'Arcy repeats his trumps in "The Merry Widow" as the suave boulevardier, who represents all the hero's jealous fears.

Renee Adoree makes a charming Musetta, while Gino Corrado, Edward Everett Horton and George Hassell are a lovable trio of Bohemians in the quaint French quarter.

The cast is an ideal setting for the star—both are perfect in the famous romance of the art quarter.

It is a picture ever to be remembered.

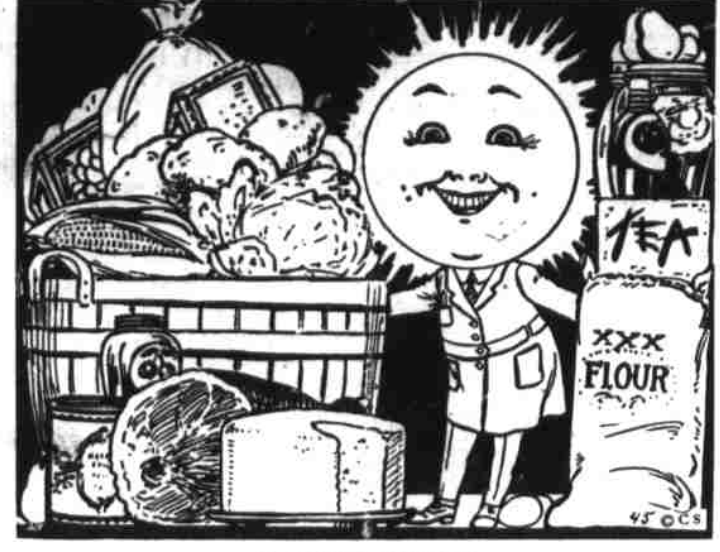
