

Asheville Tobacco Mart Open Dec. 9

Date Might be Postponed unless Farmers have Rain. Tobacco To Brittle To Handle.

Haywood County farmers will be interested to know that December 9 has been set as the opening date for the tobacco warehouses in Asheville. The dates were fixed at a conference of warehouse officials and representatives of The American Tobacco Company and the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company. Tobacco men are enthusiastic over the prospects for this season. Tobacco men pointed out that the condition of the weather and the wind will govern the opening of the market. Unusually dry weather in this section has made the tobacco extremely brittle and unless it rains before December 9, it is possible that the opening will be postponed because of the fragile leaf would break the tobacco.

Plans for the opening of other tobacco markets throughout the country have also been announced. The market at Lexington, Ky., the next and the last burley market open in the country will begin operations Monday, Dec. 7, the market at Greenville, Tenn., will get under way Tuesday, Dec. 8, and the Asheville market is scheduled to open Wednesday, Dec. 9.

The Carolina warehouse, which was opened last year, was the first tobacco warehouse to be operated in Asheville for a number of years. It is under the management of B. B. Sanders. The Banner warehouse on Lexington avenue is a new venture which will open for the first time this year.

Saturday Night Bath for Automobile Radiators

Then drain and if radiator is very rusty or dirty, repeat the flushing with another borax solution. When the radiator drains, fill up with fresh water.

Keep the radiator free from rust and scale before it has a chance to give the radiator a borax bath, once a week or at regular intervals.

Turn Your Leaves Into Fertilizer

In many cities and towns throughout the country there is a commendable movement on foot to do away with the old method of disposing of the leaves which cover lawns and gardens during the fall.

The customary practice of burning creates a vicious smoke nuisance which is objected to by even the most fair-minded citizen. Often these leaves are raked into the street gutters to be burned. While this is a reasonably safe place from the standpoint of fire hazard, it may be quite destructive to the pavement. Especially is this true if the street is paved with crushed stone laid together with a tar or asphalt material. The damage is done in later months by a crumbling or disintegration of the street surface.

A useful method of disposal which is meeting with almost universal approval is to compost the leaves. This is easily done by piling alternate layers of leaves and dirt on the ground in a rough wooden box of suitable size. Before covering each layer of leaves with dirt, spread a thin coating of a mixture composed of 2 parts hydrated lime, 2 parts su-

superphosphate and 1 part ammonia sulphate on the mass. Continue in this manner until all the leaves and debris are used.

Early in the spring the pile of material should be forked over and at that time a little more of the lime-superphosphate-ammonia sulphate mixture may be added. These materials, which are procurable at garden supply store, hasten the rotting process and add to the fertilizing value of the decomposed mass. During the summer the compost may be used on the lawn, on flower beds, around shrubs, etc., furnishing the soil with the much needed and highly valued humus.
