ORDERED BY THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF HAYWOOD COUNTY

WHEREAS, the order of this Board introduced December 7th, 1931, authorizing an issue of \$35,000 Courthouse and Jail Bonds has been duly published and the time for hearing protests thereon has arrived and an opportunity has been given for protests to be presented, NOW THEREFORE, ordered that the said order is hereby adopted in the form in which it was introduced to-wit:

ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF HAYWOOD COUNTY

1. That bonds of the county shall be issued for the purpose of purchasing, constructing, erecting and equipping a new Courthouse and Jail, and for the purpose of acquiring, either by purchase or condemnation any lands needed therefor, in a sum not to exceed thirty five thousand dollars. 2. That a tax, sufficient to pay the principal interest of the bonds, when due, shall be annually levied and collected, that a statement of the County debt, for other than school purposes, has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection. 3. That this order shall take effect thirty days after the first publication thereof, after final passage, unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed, under the County Finance Act, and that in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the County at an election, as provided in the County Finance Act. Pursuant to Chapter 214, Public Local Laws 1925, an unforeseen emergency is here by declared to exist. CERTIFICATE I, hereby, certify that the foregoing is a true and correct copy from the minutes of a meeting as indicated of the Board of County Commissioners of Haywood County, North Carolina, held the 4th day of January, 1932.
