DRENCH LAMBS FOR THE STOMACH WORMS

Fresh pastures and drenching when needed will save the North Carolina lamb crop from the deadly attack of stomach worms. "The many advantages of this State for growing quality lambs for eastern markets are offset somewhat by the prevalence of stomach worms in all parts of piedmont and eastern North Carolina," says John E. Foster, animal husbandman at State College. "It is true that we have a variety of grasses and legumes, a long pasturing season, and a favorable location to markets; but these advantages are worthless if precautions are not taken to control the stomach worm. The worm is a small parasite of the fourth stomach and is one of the most serious menaces to sheep growing in the South."

Since 1928, a series of experiments have been conducted by the North Carolina Experiment Station to determine the best means of controlling this parasite, Mr. Foster says. Tests have been conducted on all kinds of drenching practices and other methods of control. Enough lambs have been left out of each test to determine what the results would be by comparison. As a result of this four years of investigation, Mr. Foster has arrived at five definite conclusions. He has found that all lambs grazing on permanent pasture must be drenched for stomach worms if the lambs are to live and thrive. The drenching should be done throughout the season from June until frost at intervals of 28 days. Drenching at 14 day intervals is better and safer. It is not necessary to fast the lambs before drenching. Satisfactory results are secured when the lambs are allowed to continue on feed. The most practical method of control is to change pastures as often as possible and supplement this by drenching whenever seems to be necessary, Foster concludes.
