D. A. R. HAS BI-CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION
Mrs. Rufus Siler was hostess to a large and interesting meeting of the Dorcas Bell Love Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in a George Washington Bi-Centennial Celebration at her lovely home in Hazelwood on the afternoon of February 10. The spacious rooms were decorated with flags and flowers and on the walls hung the beautifully framed Stuart portrait of Washington and a framed copy of all flags used by the colonies down to our own Stars and Stripes.
These copies are both to be presented to the Waynesville Township High School on the 200th birthday anniversary of the First President of the United States at the annual declamation contest for boys of the high school. The winner of the contest will receive a gold medal which will be the 24th to be given by the chapter for the same purpose.
The members and guests of the afternoon were received by the hostess and her assistants all dressed in Colonial costumes. A number of the members were also in costume—the most notable being that worn by Mrs. Sarah Stringfield Sloan. Her gown formerly belonged to her grandmother, Mrs. James Robert Love.

George Washington, The Soldier, was the subject of a paper written and read by Mrs. J. E. Henderson. When Mrs. Henderson took the floor, she remarked that she was going "to fight the Revolutionary War from start to finish" which was absolutely true. In her paper she gave a most comprehensive description of the soldierly talent of George Washington, the battles in which he took part and the end of the war with the surrender of Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown, October, 1781. In the words of a distinguished guest of the afternoon, "Mrs. Henderson's paper was a masterpiece."
