An Extract From History Of Haywood, As Written By Prof. W. C. Allen

HAYWOOD COUNTY'S SOLDIER IN THE WAR OF 1812

Although the War of 1812 did not produce much stir in Western North Carolina because the seat of war was at a remote distance from our mountain homes, still there were thousands of men who offered their services to the State and Federal Government and were held in reserve ready to be called out should there be need for them. Following is the list of volunteers who were accepted for service from Haywood County:

This company of seventy-three men and officers was called for service in 1812, soon after the declaration of war. It is not clear as to where they served, the record not being explicit; but it is more than probable that they were retained in Western North Carolina to watch the Indians who were preparing to go on the warpath in aid of the British. Many of them were with Andrew Jackson the next year when he subdued the Creek Indians in Alabama.

Another company was raised in 1814 and detached from the Seventh Regiment. William Cathey, a distinguished soldier from Haywood County, was made first major, and Thomas Lenoir, also of the county was made second major. This company of seventy-two men and officers was ordered on January 25, 1815, to rendezvous at Wadesboro, North Carolina, where they remained until some time in May of that year when they were mustered out of service.
