ing some revenue. Many doubt that better bred animals would return a profit on this kind of grazing. It is true that animals, like plants, must be fed and cared for if they are to thrive and return a profit; yet, much of this native grazing should be utilized better than it is at present."

Mr. Hostetler says landowners in tick free territory need to know what kind of legumes and cultivated grasses will give them the best results in respective sections. North Carolina farmers need also to learn that southern protein feeds such as cotton-seed meal could be used to better advantage. Northern and western livestock growers have long been large users of these feeds but down here where the feed is grown, it is little used to grow out finished animals.

Cotton-seed meal, peanut meal, soybean meal and other such feeds produced in this state could be used in fattening livestock here at home and the fertility kept on home farms. Until the North Carolina farmer learns to feed livestock, just so long will he buy meat from Chicago, work stock
