

Robinson, County Agent, Urges Farmers To Use Certified Seed Potatoes

Robinson, County Agent, must raise the larger portion of it here. There are two plans by which this can be done.

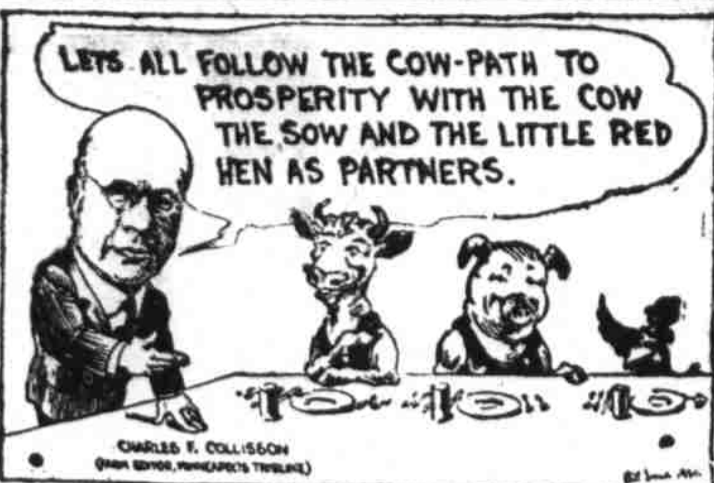
One or more bags of certified seed can be bought and next year's seed grown from these. When this is done they should be planted 500 yards from other potatoes to prevent insects carrying disease, or carefully sprayed with poisoned Bordeaux to kill the insects and diseases.

Some men raising crops of potatoes on or near the tops of mountains can raise clean seed much easier than those in the valleys. Both diseases and insects are less severe at the altitudes. It would be possible for those growers to produce certified seed. Mr. Verlin Campbell undertook this last year and has a crop of potatoes of excellent quality, but the vine infection showed a few diseased plants that prevented approval.

Mr. Henry Francis used certified seed in 1930, planted what he produced according to Mr. Neswonger's instructions for his 400 bushel club. He did an excellent job of cultivation, and sprayed four times. His vines were almost entirely free of disease, and in spite of the unfavorable season last year, he harvested 330 bushels on one and one fifth acres, and was one of the ten high men in Western Carolina.

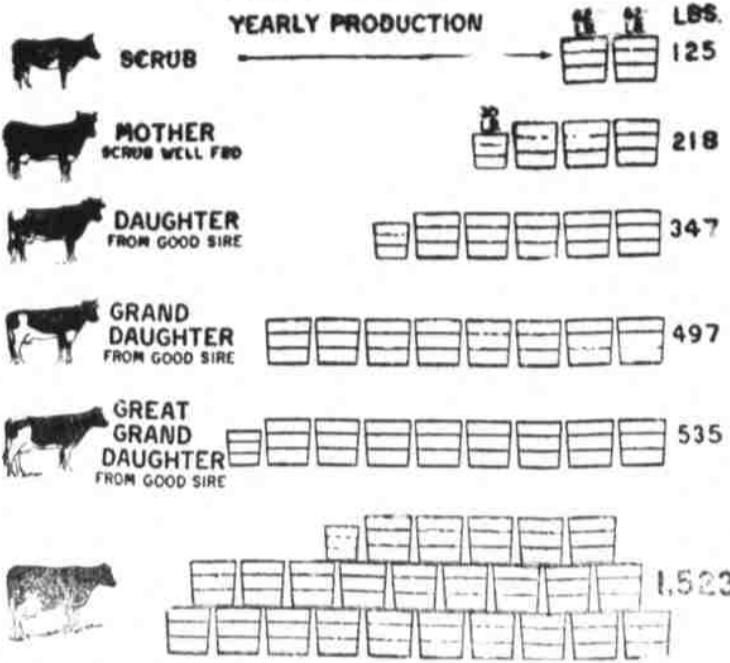
Most farmers cannot plant their whole crop with good seed this year, but by planning ahead they can next year. It would mean many thousands of dollars.

... must depict the advantages in purebred dairy cows. Common cows give about 125 pounds of butter annually. Mated with a purebred Holstein bull a grade half-blooded daughter gives 347 pounds of butter annually. The daughter's income was 58 per cent, granddaughter's, 204 per cent, and great granddaughter's, 225 per cent larger than the scrub cow. These yields have been compared with that of the former United States butter champion, May Walker Gille Homstead, a purebred Holstein.

Waynesville Boy Qualifies For The Culver Scholarship

One Waynesville boy has qualified for the Culver Military Academy scholarship competition being held this year in North Carolina. He is Kiffin R. Hayes, 201 Brunner avenue of Waynesville Township high school. He reported in Asheville last Saturday for the preliminary examination.

The scholarship is for three years and covers all expenses, including uniforms and text books. It is valued at \$6,000.

One hundred and forty three North Carolina candidates have applied for it. The winner will be selected by a committee composed of Dr. Edgar W. Knight, of the School of Education of the University of North Carolina; Dr. W. A. Brownell, professor of educational psychology of Duke University; and R. H. Lathan, superintendent of schools of Winston-Salem.

The twelve or fifteen boys making the highest records in the preliminaries will be given a final examination and a personal interview with the committee at Duke University on May 17th. From that group the winner will be selected.
