New Ball
The new 1932 golf ball which was officially adopted March 1st, is meeting with a great success according to several sports writers from different parts of the country. Its best qualities seems to be on the putting green where it is reputed to be making its best performances. The difference between it and the old balls is the same weight as the ball used in 1930, same size as the one used in 1931. It is one and sixty eight one hundredths of an inch in diameter and weighs one and sixty two one hundredths of an ounce, being seven one hundredths of an ounce heavier than last years ball and six one hundredths of an inch larger than the one used in 1930.
